Postal Savings Bank Opens Nov. 22.

Uncle Sam will open a postal savings bank here the 22nd of this month. Postmaster Hacker has on hand now the official blanks but the bank will not receive deposits until the above date. Deposits from 10 cents to \$50 may be made at one time. Should you have \$100 you wish to deposit, you will have to come two times. The highest amount that any person can have on deposit is \$500. This is done in order to keep the newspaper men from getting a controlling interest in the bank. Mr. Hacker was showing us a blank to be filled out before one can hand over his money. It is quite explicit as to detail, and when filled out contains about as much information as a census report. As we remember, the depositor must in addition to his name, give age, weight, and height; where born, the year, month, and day this important event occurred. Whether, if a male, he's a man, or, if a female, she's a woman. In addition to this a personal description, whether blonde or brunette; if a man, whether smooth face or whiskers; if facial foliage how worn—burnside, galloway or van dyke; if a moustache, whether black, gray, sorrel, or of a ducro shade and if trimmed to resemble a dauber on a shoe brush, pig-tail twist or pirate droop. If a lady the color of her hair, and whether a natural shade or one acquired peroxidely. Whether fair or freckled, natural complexion or artificial and if addicted to the gum habit, the brand most used and whether married or unmarried, widow or divorcee. The name of the depositor's father and mother with nationality and year of birth.

The above of course is not an exact wording of the application blank but is near enough to show that your Uncle Samuel is as particular about identification of patrons of his bank as he is about allowing a pension. But he's backed by the United States of America and according to Dun and Bradstreet he is good as old wheat. He does not pay as high a rate of interest but he will exchange you government bonds that your assessor can not tax. This will help some. Gov bonds for us, Wm.
