Bladen to Have Electric Lights

Line Now Being Surveyed and Work Soon to Begin

The charter has been granted the Webster County Light and Power Company, and the line is now being surveyed between here and Blue Hill, preparatory to letting the contract for building the electric line to furnish power to Bladen. It is the purpose to have the construction work begin soon and the line hurried to completion, and Bladen will before many weeks have the plant in operation. In the meantime the work of wiring the houses in town is progressing and by the time the power is ready to turn on a goodly number will be lined up.—Bladen Enterprise.

Eastern Sheep Fanciers To Judge at Omaha Show

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 27, 1911.—Judges for the mid-winter sheep show, which will be held in conjunction with the Forty-Eighth Annual Convention of the National Woolgrowers Association on December 11 to 14, have been named by the executive committee. Men prominent in the sheep world have been chosen to distribute the prizes, which will amount to more than \$1,500 in cash, aside from special prizes.

In casting about for judges, who would be acceptable to the great number of exhibitors, the management has gone to the four parts of the country.

In the pure classes, H. L. Compton of Kyle, Ohio, E. L. Shaw of Washington, D. C. and S. M. Cleaver of Delaware, Ohio, have been chosen. Mr. Compton is a high class sheep breeder, who specializes in the medium wool breeds. He has judged in the largest shows in the United States with splendid results and comes to Omaha from one of the largest sheep breeding states in the country.

Mr. Shaw is a past-master in the art of judging mutton breeds. For the past year, he has been connected with the Tariff Board compiling data concerning the sheep industry of the United States and is particularly well equipped to award the ribbons in the Omaha show.

Mr. Cleaver, who is secretary of the American and Delaue Record Association, is generally recognized as one of the best informed men on Merino types of sheep. Cleaver refused an invitation to talk before the Pennsylvania State College in order that he might act as one of the judges.

The awarding of the ribbons in the fat classes will be done by J. J. Casey of South Omaha, Nebr. He is the chief buyer for Armour & Co., at South Omaha, the greatest sheep market in the country.

The selection of the judge for the Rambouillet class has been left to the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association.

The selections insure absolute fair-

ness and show that the executive committee is determined to give every exhibitor a square deal. These men have been accepted by the exhibitors without a protest.

With the time for the show and convention drawing near, the entry list is fast assuming gigantic proportions. Sufficient have already been received to insure the banner sheep show ever held in the west.

Likewise the arrangements for the convention are nearing completion. A tentative program includes addresses by leading sheep-men of the west, senators, representatives and governors. In the way of entertainment, the delegates are promised an unceasing round of merriment. Chief among the features is a smoker and vaudeville which will be given by the South Omaha stockmen on the evening of December 15. Arrangements are also under way for a reception and theatre party the preceding night. A theatre will be bought out for the evening and every member of the association and his friends will be the guests of the Omaha Commercial Club and the business men.

Omaha realizes the importance of the convention and the men who constitute its membership. They will be given the best in shop and in the metropolis that means the best there is to be had in the country.
