Nebraska Beat

Kansas In Crops

Raised More Corn, Potatoes and Alfalfa
--Grand Total is More.

LINCOLN, NEB., Jan. 9.—Nebraska beat Kansas last year. The Jawhaskers raised 195,000,000 bushels of corn, but Nebraska raised 133,000,000 bushels. This showing was in the face of the fact that Kansas has 800,000 more population than has Nebraska.

The report of Labor Commissioner Gage further shows that Nebraska produced an Irish potato crop worth a little less than \$50,000,000, and that the Kansas crop was worth less than \$2,000,000.

All kinds of farm products in Kansas were valued at less than \$292,000,000, and in Nebraska they were valued at \$319,000,000.

Nebraska's alfalfa crop alone last year is valued at 33 1/2 percent more than all the alfalfa and tame grass of Kansas. The Nebraska crop was 1,367,000 tons.

Society for the Friendless

Rev. J. A. Leavitt, Superintendent of the Nebraska Division of the Society for the Friendless was in town Sunday and organized a Juvenile Protective League. This league has as its effect the mature of the young and the promotion of the society for the friendless. The society has five departments of work:

1. The Prevention of Crime.
2. The Reformation of Prison Laws.
3. The Reformation of Prisons.
4. The Reform of Prisoners.
5. The Care of ex-Prisoners.

It aims at the extension of the Juvenile Court work through out the state.

The organization of Juvenile Protection League whenever parents are sufficiently interested in their own off spring and that of others to warrant it.

The restriction of marriage of those physically, mentally and morally fit.

The society has opened a temporary home in Lincoln for discharged prisoners. Many of them have little money, little clothing and no friends. Under these circumstances many of them are likely to relapse into crime. By meeting their immediate needs, providing for them a good environment and obtaining for them employment this society makes good citizens of those who otherwise would become confirmed criminals.
