 County Superintendent Gertrude L. Coon among other things is asking all the teachers in the county to teach the children how to test seed corn. This recommendation is most timely because corn this year seems to be very much lacking in germination power and by teaching the children all the farmers in the county will be reached. This will also show the children that there is a practical side to the study of agriculture and will stimulate them to do thinking for themselves.

We believe that the time has come for the citizens of this city to make a radical change in the manner of selecting city officials. We believe that we are all agreed in one thing and that is efficiency. We all want to make a showing and we all want every department of city affairs up to the standard. Why not let harmony prevail? Why not magnify our unity and let the discords alone? We propose that this year all partisanship be set aside and that we gather an intelligent people and select our officials in a rational way and let the bickerings, the discords, the lies and all that quietly float down the valley. Under this plan we can prevail upon efficient men to accept the responsibility. When they feel that they have the backing of the greater portion of the city they will be in a position to go ahead and do things. If we would only spend half as much energy in working for better conditions as we use in fighting each other we would be the third city of the state in five years. After we get together in this manner let no man refuse to serve. If we agree on what we want the official will be carrying out the desires of the city and cannot be accused of projecting personal hobbies. In union there is strength let us unite.

Thinking people realize that beneficial charges could be inaugurated in our school curriculum. The instillation of the course in manual training was a step in the right direction and is proving to be of great help to the boys which consequently is of great benefit to the community. The purpose of education should be to fit children for the duties of life and this is what every community desires to do. But now that we are looking after the interests of the boys why not go a step farther and offer a course which will be of benefit to nine-tenths of our girls? By far the largest per cent of girls make home making their vocation and

we offer scarcely nothing to all them in this work. We would not eliminate the so-called cultural course but we would like to see the board of education offer a course in domestic hygiene. The girls become the housekeepers of our community and they should be offered the opportunity of learning something of the science of that vocation. This would solve to a great extent the so-called "servant problem." It would raise the household work up to where it belongs right beside the profession of law, medicine, nursing or teaching. It would dignify the labor and make it valuable. Such a course could be easily arranged for and as a material consideration it would pay back to the community one hundred per cent on the investment. We respectfully present the matter to the board and trust that they will give it serious consideration.

**Washington Expert Will Accompany Seed Corn Trains**  
 OMAHA, NEB., Feb. 5th. Recognizing the urgency of the seed corn situation in Nebraska, the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., has detailed Prof. L. L. Zook, a corn specialist in the Department, to visit Nebraska and accompany the seed corn trains, which will tour the state the last week in February. Prof. Zook is deemed one of the greatest corn specialists in the country and his visit to Nebraska at this time will not only be of profit to the state but also indicates that the urgency of the seed corn situation is recognized at Washington where the department, through the systems of reports, keeps in intimate touch with every section of the country.  
 Arrangements will be made whereby Prof. Zook will be enabled to spend part of his time with each of the four trains, which will be sent out.  
 The dates for the trains have been changed. Instead of starting on February 19th, the start will be made on February 26th, one week later. The Burlington will run two trains, one starting from Omaha and the other from Lincoln. The Northwestern will run one train, as will the Union Pacific.  
 These trains will be run under the auspices of the Department of Agricultural Extension of the University of Nebraska. The speakers will be under the direction of Prof. C. W. Pugsley, head of the department. Prof. Pugsley is making up his assignment of speakers, which will be announced next week. The list of speakers so far include twenty-two, four to a train. Those who have already been secured are: Chancellor S. Avery, of Nebraska University, Dean E. A. Burnett, Prof. W. P. Snyder, director of North Platte Experiment Station, Prof. F. W. Chase, Prof. T. A. Kieselbach, Prof. C. W. Pugsley, Prof. Irwin Hoyt, Prof. C. B. Lee, and H. J. Gramlich, all of the Nebraska Experiment Station.  
 From the Farmers Institute department, these will be detailed: O. Hull, of Alma, Neb., E. P. Brown, of Arbor, J. D. Beam of Broken Bow, Frank G. Odell of Lincoln, A. E. Nelson, of Lincoln.  
 These well known agricultural leaders will also accompany the train: S. R. McKelvie, Lincoln, T. E. Sturgess and G. W. Hervey and H. A. Bereman of Omaha.

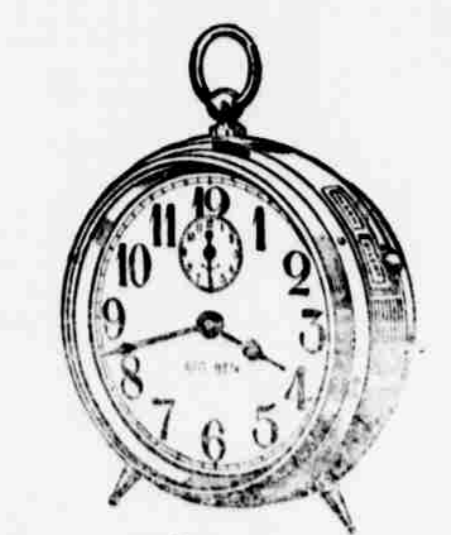
