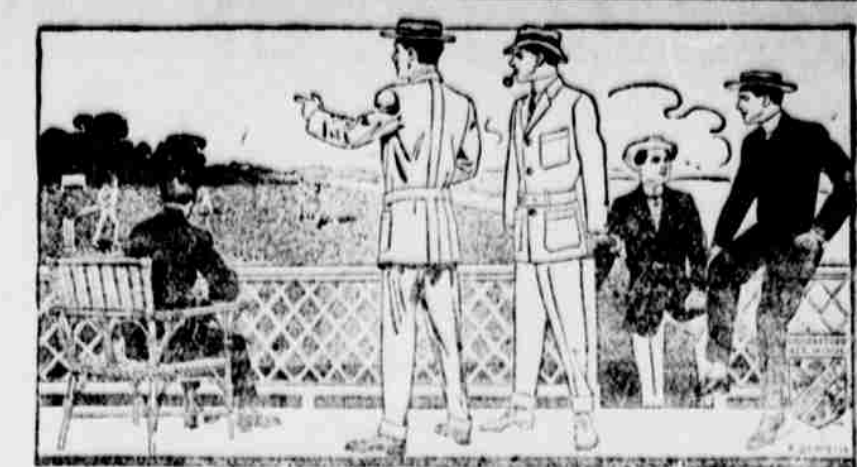

### Harry H. Carpenter

Harry H. Carpenter, son of Hopkins and Olive Carpenter was born near Pleasanton, Lincoln county, Kansas, on March 10th, 1869, and departed this life at his late home near Inavale, Nebr., April 3rd, 1912 at the age of 43 years and 18 days.  
While he was quite young his parents moved to Missouri and later to Decatur county, Iowa, near Leon. After the death of his parents he went to Shenandoah, Iowa, in 1889 and worked for 6 years. He was united in marriage to Ellen Bloom Feb. 26, 1896. To this union was born eight children, four sons and four daughters. They lived on a farm near Northboro until in March 1910, they moved to their present home four and one half miles northwest of Inavale.  
For about 13 months he was afflicted with a complicated disease which medical skill was unable to cure or relieve only for a short time.  
Owing to his weakened condition his heart gave way under the strain and he passed away very suddenly, a few minutes after 6 o'clock as he sat talking to his wife and her sister.  
He was a member of the M. W. A. of Northboro. Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist church in Inavale, Sunday, April 7th at 11 a. m. Interment at Red Cloud cemetery conducted by the Modern Women. Besides his wife and children he leaves to mourn his loss two brothers, Clifford and Warren and a large circle of friends. Those attending the funeral from a distance were his two brothers of Cedar Rapids, Nebr., George Bloom a brother of Mrs. Carpenter, of Northboro and Mr. and Mrs. Perry Bennett of Bloomington, Nebr.

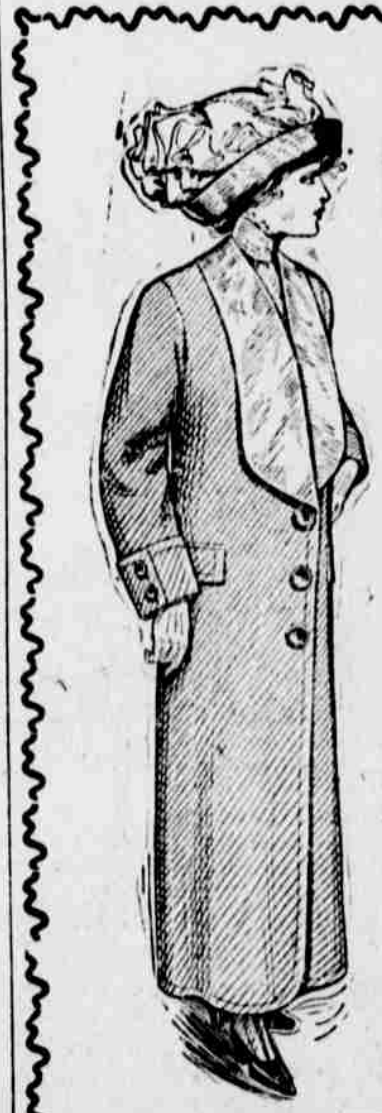
