Death of Frisbie N. Richardson

Frisbie N. Richardson died suddenly at his home in Red Cloud Saturday night from heart disease. He had been suffering for some years with dropsical affection and a weak heart, so that any unusual activity of body or violent emotion of mind was attended with extreme danger. During Saturday afternoon he had allowed his feelings to be more than usually excited and this excitement, perhaps, severed the weakened threads that united him to life. Without warning the heart ceased to beat—and a familiar face will be seen no more on the streets of the city.

Mr. Richardson was one of the pioneers of the county. With Sam Miller, Frank Coakley, G. W. Ball and C. C. Cox he located on the southern banks of Elm Creek in the fall of 1871. Z. P. Earl, John Emick and the Rassers had preceded him by a few months. He removed from the farm to Red Cloud about twenty years ago and engaged in the lively stable business for a while. Subsequently he made his home

north of the city, finally making his home in the city a year ago.

Mr. Richardson was a veteran of the Civil war, enlisting in Indiana and serving with the western army in its early battles to open the Mississippi. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. and the Modern Woodmen. He was one of the leaders of the populist movement in the Republican party, an original greenbacker. He was also radically opposed to the liquor traffic. He was seventy years of age at the time of his death. The funeral services were conducted from the M. E. church Monday afternoon, Rev. Tompkins officiating.

Nebraska Corn Improvers' Association

Subscribers will be interested in the 1912 Five-acre Hard Winter Wheat contest which is open to every wheat grower in the state. Three years ago the South Platte Millers' Association donated a \$200 silver trophy to be awarded annually by the Nebraska Corn Improvers' Association to the wheat grower in Nebraska producing a 5-acre field giving the highest yield per acre of good quality hard winter wheat. In addition to this trophy, the Nebraska Corn Improvers' Association offers \$50 in cash prizes to be awarded as follows: First Premium \$20.00; Second premium \$15.00; Third premium \$10.00; and Fourth premium \$5.

The object of this contest is to promote the growing of more and better hard winter wheat. Nebraska now produces 45,000,000 bushels of wheat annually, which is three times as much as twenty years ago. During the last ten years, wheat has averaged four bushels per acre more than during any previous ten year period. These increases are due chiefly to increased acreage, the replacing of spring wheat with Turkey winter, and better methods of sowing, especially the use of the press drill.

The Nebraska production of wheat can and should be still greatly increased. There is no better way of arousing interest than for the wheat growers of the state to enter into a friendly contest of this character. It will do much to call attention to the best methods of wheat growing. It costs nothing to enter. Memorial day Exercises

Bayne. After a song by the little girls a flag drill by granddaughters of the old veterans was an interesting feature of the program.

A recitation by Florence Johnston and a solo by Mildred Fulton were highly appreciated after which Rev. Cole, pastor of the Baptist church, spoke eloquently of the colors of old glory, "The Red, White and Blue." The services were most appropriately closed by the singing of "America."

National Musicians Subscribe

At the annual meeting of the American Federation of Musicians, which was held in Omaha last week, \$1,000 was set aside from the funds of the association for the survivors of the musicians who went down on the ill-fated Titanic.

In addition, it was decided to start a series of musical entertainments throughout the United States, the proceeds of which will go to the relief fund. In this way it is hoped to raise \$25,000 for the widows and children of the musicians.
