Red Cloud will not celebrate the Fourth this year consequently we are waiting for an invitation. We understand that Guide Rock will celebrate and if such is the case we know that the good people there will welcome the entire county.

We had occasion to travel over the Inavale road this week and saw the good effects of putting the King road-drag into use. The road bed is smooth, without ruts, without chuckholes and shows what can be done with Nebraska soil. It costs money to build a good road but the upkeep is small if properly handled. The money that is spent in making the right kind of a road goes right back into the pockets of the taxpayer because the farmer can haul his products to market at a reduced cost per mile and when the farmer saves waste it reaches indirectly every person in the community. We are pleased that our commissioners have adopted the plan of making good roads and keeping them good.

As we examine the program for the chautauqua more carefully we find that we are pleased more and more. Take for instance the attraction called "The Saddlers," a whole chautauqua in themselves except music. Dr. Saddler is a practicing physician of Chicago, is a professor in one of the leading schools, a director in others and a member of many societies. He is one of the very few American physicians of high professional and ethical standing who has consented to stand upon the lecture platform and instruct the layman in the science of living or the adept of keeping well. He uses plain every day language so that all may understand. After the lecture he will answer questions. His time is necessarily limited and only a few chautauquas succeed in securing his services. Mrs. Saddler travels with him, also a physician, and talks about the vital questions of the home. She tells all about the children, how to care for and feed them, how to dress them, how to educate them and what to do when they are sick. She is assisted by Miss Kellogg, a trained nurse, who conducts classes of instruction for mothers in teaching them how to intelligently use hot and cold water and home remedies. All three of these people demonstrate as their lectures proceed. They have with them a noted reader, Miss Willmer, who captivates every audience. These people give four programs a day the like of which has never appeared on the Red Cloud chautauqua platform.

Let us democrats thank heaven that our convention will be free from the disgraceful scenes which are happening in the republican gathering. We have no pie distributor in the presidency bribing the negroes and the negro drivers of the South. We have no Taft, for which let us be devoutly grateful. We have no Barnes. Let us again rejoice. We will have no delegates in the convention who represent no electoral votes. The republican party is now reaping the punishment of its mistakes and its sins. It gave the negro the vote in the hopes of acquiring power in the southern states. It gave the southern states equal representation in their national convention. Woman Prison Warden.

The newly-appointed warden of the prison for the Canton Wandland in Switzerland is a woman, Frau Fanny Porchet. In her application for the post, she said that in the course of her husband's administration as warden, and particularly during the illness which caused his death, she had acted as warden and found that she was in every way competent to fill the place. Knowing that there might be some doubt as to her physical ability to handle obstreperous prisoners, she offered to meet the strongest man on the police force in a wrestling contest. Frau Porchet was invited to appear before the appointing board and made such a favorable impression that she was appointed without demonstrating her strength. She is 41 years old.—New York Tribune.

Selling Faked Butterflies.

One of the meanest frauds on record is that which is said to have been practiced recently on entomologists. It appears that there is a systematic trade in forged butterflies carried on by continental dealers. The method as described is to cover the wings of moths after setting with a heavy coat of powder, which is then tinted with pastel colors to suit the taste of amateurs.

Not content with imitating the rarer species, the forgers have recently been improving on nature and selling hitherto unknown varieties at unheard-of prices. One expert was for a while taken in with a red butterfly with blue polka dots, but this bold piece of imagination ultimately led to the exposure of the fraud.—London Letter to the New York Sun.

Ordinance No. 90

An Ordinance to Amend Section 14 of Ordinance No. 85, an Ordinance concerning the Water Works of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska:

Section 1. Section 14 of Ordinance No. 85, approved December 12th, 1911, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 14. "All moneys due said city for water furnished, will become due and payable on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year, provided however, that the water commissioner may, at his discretion, exact a monthly payment for water so used, and as hereinafter provided. Bills for water furnished shall be rendered by the water commissioner at the times stated above, and shall designate the number of gallons registered at the date of the bill, subtracting therefrom the number of gallons registered at the time of the last settlement, and computing in dollars and cents the amount due in accordance with the rates hereinafter provided."

Section 2. Section 14 of ordinance No. 85 as heretofore existing is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and publication.

Ordinance No. 91

An Ordinance to Amend Section 9 of Ordinance No. 17, relating to the Electric Light system of the City of Red Cloud.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska:

Section 1. Section 9 of ordinance No. 17 approved April 24th, 1908, is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 9. "Bills for service and current are due on the first day of each month for the preceding month."

Section 2. Section 9 of ordinance No. 17, as heretofore existing is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and publication.
