CHRONOLOGICAL NOTES

Important Events of Both Conventions
as They Have Occurred.

REPUBLICAN.

Monday, June 17.

Colonel Roosevelt addressed a monster meeting in the Auditorium, in which he bitterly arraigned his opponents and charged the national committee with fraudulently seating delegates in the convention.

Tuesday, June 18.

Convention called to order by Victor Rosewater, chairman of the national committee, and call was read by Secretary Hayward.

Governor Hadley moved to amend the temporary roll, but was ruled out of order by Chairman Rosewater.

Governor McGovern of Wisconsin and Elihu Root were nominated for temporary chairman. The Taft forces supported Root, who was elected by a majority of 43.

Wednesday, June 19.

The convention plunged into a debate on Gov. Hadley's motion, which in effect was that none of the contested delegates be allowed a vote on any of the contests. Motion lost by a vote of 519 to 563. Regarded as a Taft victory.

Governor Hadley of Missouri received a forty-minute demonstration in the convention.

The Roosevelt men on the credentials committee, with the exception of R. R. McCormick of Chicago, bolted, claiming the rules of the committee unfair.

Thursday, June 20.

The talk of a bolt by Roosevelt was rampant during the day, but subsided by night, and many of the colonel's friends said that nothing of the kind was contemplated.

A report that Roosevelt had released all his delegates was denied by the colonel.

Mr. Roosevelt issued a statement in which he said he would make the race for president either as a republican or an independent progressive.

The convention itself was in session only five minutes during the day.

Friday, June 21.

The convention took up piece-meal the contests from many states and in each instance the Taft delegates were declared entitled to their seats by majorities ranging from a high water Taft vote of 604 to a narrow margin of 542 to 529. The latter vote was in the California case.

Saturday, June 22.

Convention completed its work by the adoption of a platform and the nomination of Wm. H. Taft for president and James S. Sherman for vice-president.

After the close of the convention the Roosevelt workers called a meeting and nominated the Colonel for president to head a new party.

DEMOCRATIC.

Thursday, June 20.

Judge Alton B. Parker of New York was selected as temporary chairman and Urey Woodson of Kentucky temporary secretary. Choice made by committee on arrangements.

Friday, June 21.

W. J. Bryan telegraphed five candidates for the presidential nomination asking them to join him in the opposition to the selection of Parkekr as temporary chairman.

Saturday, June 22.

Woodrow Wilson announced his determination to stand by Bryan in opposition to Parker as temporary chairman.

Sunday, June 23.

W. J. Bryan reaches Baltimore, is given an ovation and in an interview states that he will oppose Parker for temporary chairman and if necessary carry the fight to the floor of the convention.

Will Not Ask for Franchise.

Fremont, Neb.—General Manager Baker of the "Nebraska Transportation company," the concern which claims to have financed an Interurban to run from Omaha to Fremont and from Fremont to Norfolk, declared in Fremont Friday that the permanent survey has been started between Fremont and Omaha.

Orders Return of Ships.

Washington.—A sign of the confidence of the state department in the stability of the new Chinese government and its ability to maintain law and order was the order issued from the navy department Wednesday for the return to the United States of Admiral Sutherland with his flagship California and the armored cruiser South Dakota.

Rock Rapids, Ia.—The 18-month-old child of Charles Brown, while playing with a can containing gasoline, inhaled the fumes and died in a few hours.

Governor Aldrich returned from the Chicago convention Sunday, "more a Roosevelt man than ever." While he did not wait in Chicago for the Roosevelt meeting Saturday night he stated on his arrival here that that movement on the part of the Roosevelt forces had the hearty support of those like himself, who were semi-official observers of the proceedings. The steam roller as an implement of war did not strike the fancy of the governor.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR JUNE 30

REVIEW OF SECOND QUARTER.

GOLDEN TEXT—"I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill."—Matt. 5:17.

The lessons for this quarter, being long for the most part to the year 28, known as the year of popularity. Beginning with the great Easter lesson there is set forth the fact, certainty, and meaning of the resurrection of our Lord, by which was demonstrated his fulfilling of the purpose of God both in his own life and in his work upon the cross whereby was made possible the establishment of the new kingdom. Several of these lessons are taken from his manifesto to show us the application of the law which he came to fill full with a newer and richer meaning. Speaking of the ideal Sabbath as contrasted with that presented by the religious teachers of the day, Jesus uses the illustration of healing and also the plucking of grain to show us that man is of more value than the ceremonial observance of the law. Jesus proceeds in the third lesson to choose and set apart those who shall share with him in the establishing of this new kingdom.

In the fourth lesson Jesus depicts the character necessary for those who shall share with him in the fulfilling of God's purposes in this kingdom. The blessings of poverty and the danger of riches form the subject matter of the fifth lesson wherein we are taught a full revelation concerning life and its true substance.

Key to Situation.

The sixth lesson has to do with love as the secret of the fulfillment of all that is required, of all that has been already stated, or that may hereafter arise. In this lesson by a set of skillful questions Jesus asks and answers the fundamental principles of this law of love. So deep does he build and so high does he reach that we are compelled to exclaim, "Who is sufficient." And so it is that the seventh lesson logically follows the sixth, for in this we find the key to the whole situation. Beginning with the verse that forms the golden text for today, Jesus goes on to show us that what is impossible with man is possible with God. That while the law is immutable and its penalties therefore still in force, that he, Jesus, is the one and only one who keeps the law outwardly and at the same time its spirit and intent as well; hence we have in him and his righteousness all that is essential.

The eighth lesson still further carries out this teaching by showing us the fact that in the constant consciousness of God there lies power that will enable men, independent of oaths, in simple truth to fulfill all the requirements of truth.

The ninth lesson is one of the practical applications of these principles which Jesus has been setting forth. The ancient high priest with the bells and pomegranates upon his garment carried as much fruit as noise into the holy place. So Jesus, this new high priest teaches us that though we are justified in the sight of God by our faith we demonstrate that faith in the sight of men by our actions toward those about us.

If we are truly and properly spiritually related to him our aims and prayers and fasting will not be for the purpose of attracting the attention of men but each disciple will be as his master who sought off to glorify the Father. This is the man who builds upon solid ground and whose house stands amid the breaking storm rather than the one whose house not so founded goes to pieces amid the storm. This is the tenth lesson.


Dominant Notes.

Following these lessons upon the kingdom Jesus is shown in the eleventh lesson as depicting John the Baptist's place and significance as the forerunner of himself and because of that position as being the exalted among those born of women yet he who in humbleness is little shall be greater even than John. John represented the end of the old and Jesus the beginning of the new.

The last lesson affords us a significant view, a radiant revelation, of the compassion and at the same time the mercifully keen discernment of Jesus. His dealing with her who gave her best as contrasted with Simon who from his abundance gave only discourtesy and friendless criticism, teaches us what should be the real heart motive of our lives. He who came to break the shell of self complacency glorified the act of the sinful woman who in contrition broke her alabaster box at his feet; he who loving much could forgive much.

There are two or three notes that are dominant throughout the lessons of this quarter. He, Jesus, who is the light, not only sets up high standards but at the same time shows men the path of attainment. Again in all of his work there is a perfect co-operation of the son with the Father in the carrying out of the beneficent work of this new kingdom.

Though the old is set aside it is not set down, but contrariwise it is raised higher, and in its fulfillment has ever raised men higher and nearer God.
