SCOUTCRAFT - The Manual reads: "To be a Scout means to be prepared to bless you, gentlemen!" do the right thing at the right moment, no matter what the consequences may be "

WOODCRAFT - Which enables the Scout to find his way no matter where he is; teaches him the various kinds of wild-fruit roots, nuts, etc ; teaches him careful observation, etc.

CAMPERAFT OF ALLKINDS-Including tenting, cooking, boating, swimming, tracking, signaling, etc. Also, health and endurance, chivalry, first aid and life-saving, games and athletics, patriotism and citizenship.

Meetings should be, if possible, once a week. The main difficulty is in getting a good Scout-master. It must be someone reliable, responsible, and whom the boys will respect.

It is wisely recommended to "go slow." Get things well started. Let each boy have his own task. Send to headquarters for a Booklet on Formation of Patrols and Troops. Each boy should have a Manual.
