That Nebraska has made good in her RED CLOUD, - NEBRASKA wheat crop this year is shown by the fact that Omaha has forged to third place among the markets of the United States in wheat receipts.

According to reports from Washington, which have been received by the Bureau of Publicity, Omaha was third in wheat, second in corn, fifth in oats. and third in general receipts for the month of May Total receipts in Omaha from Nebraska shippers for the month, were 4,212,200 bushels.
