717,875 Autos Registered
Official records show that automobile registrations in the United States aggregate 717,875. The growth of the automobile business in America has been more pronounced during the past two years than at any time since the introduction of the motor vehicle. New York state heads the list with 84,389 registrations and is 30,000 ahead of California, which is the second state on the list, New Jersey is third, Ohio fourth and Pennsylvania fifth. The last on the list is Nevada, which has 520 registrations. Nebraska has 22,084.
