Chicago Banker to Talk to Nebraska Association

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 12th.—D. E. Forgan of Chicago, C. W. Pugsley of the Nebraska Experiment Station and William J. Burns, the famous detective, have accepted invitations to address the bankers of the state when they meet in annual convention in Omaha on August 25 and 27.

Mr. Forgan, who is president of the City National Bank of Chicago, will speak on the National Reserve Associations of the United States. Mr. Pugsley's address will be along cooperation lines, the theme being "How best can the banker assist agriculture." Burns, who looks after the banking interests of the state, will speak on protection to bankers and suggest methods to safeguard banks.

The Publicity Bureau of the Commercial Club is receiving acceptances from bankers, in response to invitations sent out, which indicate one of the largest crowds that ever graced a meeting of the Nebraska association.
