New Improvements at Nebraska State Fair Grounds

Some of the new improvements to be seen on the Nebraska State Fair grounds when you visit the State Fair Sept. 2 to 6 will be the grading of the entire Machinery Section on the east side so that instead of the original two hills it is now a regular slope toward the north and east, and on the east side is constructed 122x430 feet of the new steel and iron Machinery Hall, which when completed will be 400 by 740, or a building covering 7 acres of ground. A new brick and steel gate at the 17th street entrance and a steel and concrete Judges' Stand at the Race Track is also under construction. It is the aim of the management to build, so far as possible in the future, for permanence. These grounds are owned by the State of Nebraska and the Fair is our one great advertising and amusement agency for the future as well as the present.
