MANY EXPERTS ARE COMING

SEVENTEEN DETAILED TO NEBRASKA AND KANSAS.
 WASHINGTON, Sept. 10—The department of agriculture has arranged to have seventeen experts to join in the crusade against the ravages spinal meningitis among the horses of Kansas and Nebraska. These veterinarians will assemble at Lincoln, Nebr., and at Dodge City, Kas., twelve being assigned to Kansas and five to Nebraska. They will co-operate with the state and local authorities in advising the farmers regarding change of forage, which is considered necessary to meet the serious situation.—The Wednesday's State Journal.

Early Selected Seed Corn Will Greatly Increase Yield

Omaha, Nebr., Sept. 10th.—We have in Nebraska no surplus seed corn on hand this year" says Prof. C. W. Pugsley, of the Extension Department of the Nebraska Experiment Station. "If Nebraska does not have good seed from this year's crop, it will be necessary for Nebraskans to depend upon seed brought from other states. Seed brought in from other states does not yield as well as home grown seed. "If every one concerned will select their seed corn early and then properly cure it, Nebraska will not experience such a seed corn famine as that which threatened the state this spring. Not only will we have plenty of seed, but we will get greater yields, for experiments at the station have proved that well selected seed corn will produce from four to six bushels more than corn not carefully selected. "The fields this year were planted late. Immediately after planting, considerable unseasonable weather followed and in many fields the corn which was planted did not have strong germinating powers. These conditions must be borne in mind to get good seed for next year's crop." Arrangements have been made by the Bureau of Publicity of the Commercial Club whereby bulletins, prepared by Prof. Pugsley will be furnished, free of cost, either by the Bureau or by the Extension Department of the State Farm. The bulletins deal with the selection and care of seed corn. The week of September 30 to October 5 has been designated as "SEED CORN SELECTION WEEK." Every one is urged to select his corn that week so that Nebraska will have plenty of seed corn in 1913.
