Commissioners Preceedings

RED CLOUD, NEB. Sept 14, 1912
Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment Members present, T. J. Chaplin, L. F. Schmidt, G. W. Hummel and G. Ohmstede Chairman of said board.

At a meeting of the County Commissioners of Webster County, Nebraska, held at the court house in Red Cloud, Nebraska, September 14th, 1912. The following resolution was introduced by T. J. Chaplin who moves its adoption.

Be it resolved by the County Commissioners of Webster County, Nebraska, that whereas it is necessary to erect and furnish a new court house in Webster County, a proposition be submitted to the qualified voters of said county, at the general election to be held in said county on the 5th day of November 1912, to vote a special tax for that purpose sufficient to raise the sum of \$75,000.00 and that for the purpose of raising said amount, a special tax, in addition to all other taxes of five mills on the dollar, be levied on all the taxable property in said county for the years 1913, and 1914 and for the year 1915 such a levy as may be necessary to raise the remainder of the \$75,000.00 and no more, which levy for the year 1915 shall in no instance exceed five mills.

The total amount to be raised by said levy to be \$75,000.00 and no more. Said proposition to be submitted for the adoption or rejection thereof by the qualified voters of said county.

Said court house to cost completed and furnished not to exceed the sum of \$75,000.00 and to be located upon the present court house square, in Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska.

Plans and specifications of the proposed court house are hereto attached and made a part of this resolution and marked for identification.

That the county clerk be and hereby is instructed to cause said proposition to be submitted to the electors of said county, upon a separate ballot at said election as provided by Sections 11295 to 11302, inclusive, and Sections 4445 to 4449, inclusive, Cobbeys Statutes for 1911.

That notice of said election be given and published as required by Section 4445 Cobbeys Statutes for 1911 and that the form of said notice be as follows:

To the Legal Voters of Webster County, Nebraska.

NOTICE is hereby given, that at the general election to be held in Webster County, Nebraska, on the 5th day of November 1912, there will be submitted to the legal voters of said county, for their adoption or rejection, the following proposition, to-wit:

Shall the Board of County Commissioners of said county or such officers as may be charged with the duty of levying taxes therein, in addition to all other taxes, levy or cause to be levied upon all the taxable property in said county a special tax sufficient to raise the sum of \$75,000.00, and no more, for the purpose of providing a special fund for the erection, completion and furnishing of a county court house on the present court house square in Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska and for the purpose of raising \$75,000.00 shall a special tax, in addition to all other taxes, of five mills on the dollar be levied on all the taxable property in said county for the years 1913 and 1914 and for the year 1915 such a levy as may be necessary to raise the remainder of the \$75,000.00 and no more, which levy for the year 1915 shall in no instance exceed five mills.

All in accordance with the provisions of Sections 11295 to 11302, inclusive, and Sections 4445 to 4449, inclusive, Cobbeys Statutes for 1911.

Shall said board upon the adoption of said proposition proceed to let contract for the erection and completion of such proposed court house according to law and levy said tax.

That the vote on said proposition shall be by ballot on a separate ballot prepared for such election in form as follows:

COURT HOUSE TAX PROPOSITION Voters on one ballot to vote for or against the proposition to levy a special tax sufficient to raise \$75,000.00, in addition to all other taxes for erecting and furnishing a county court house, and levy special five mill tax years 1913 and 1914 and amount in 1915 sufficient to raise remainder of the \$75,000.00, tax for 1915 in no instance to exceed five mills.

AGAINST the proposition to levy a special tax sufficient to raise \$75,000.00, in addition to all other taxes, for erecting and furnishing a

county court house, and levy of special five mill tax years 1913 and 1914 and amount in 1915 sufficient to raise remainder of \$75,000.00, tax in 1915 in no instance to exceed five mills.

That said notice be published for four consecutive weeks prior to said election in the Guide Rock Signal, Blue Hill Leader, Bladen Enterprise, Webster County Argus, Commercial Advertiser and the Red Cloud Chief and that a copy of said notice be also posted up at each place of voting during the day of election.

The motion to adopt said resolution being seconded the vote thereon was as follows.

Aye. Hummel, Chaplin, Schmidt, Ohmstede.

No. None.

Whereupon the resolution was declared carried by chairman Ohmstede and the clerk instructed accordingly.

The clerk was instructed to place said proposition on a separate sample and separate official ballot, for said election in accordance with said resolution.

The following resolution was introduced by G. W. Hummel, who moved its adoption.

Resolved that the dead bodies of all horses in Webster County must be buried, not less than 6 feet under ground, or thoroughly burned within 24 hours after death, and that the County Attorney be instructed to see that the law on this subject is rigidly enforced.

It was moved and seconded by T. J. Chaplin.

The vote on said resolution was: Aye, Hummel, Chaplin, Schmidt, Ohmstede. No, None.

Resolution declared adopted by chairman Ohmstede and so ordered.

The petition of farm VanBoening et al, asking that the question of electing a County Assessor in Webster County, Nebraska, be submitted to the electors therein, coming on for consideration. Upon investigation and consideration by the board, it is found that said petition was filed with the County Clerk of Webster County, Nebraska, more than 60 days prior to the general election to be held in said county for the year 1912, that said petition is signed by at least ten per cent of the electors of Webster County, secured in not less than 2-5 of the precincts of the county, that said petition requests that the question of electing a County Assessor in Webster County, Nebraska, be submitted to the electors of said county at the 1912 general election to be held in said county.

Moved by T. J. Chaplin, that the question of electing a County Assessor in Webster County, Nebraska, be submitted to the qualified voters of said county at the general election to be held therein on the 5th day of November 1912 and that the County Clerk be and hereby is instructed to cause said question to be submitted upon the ballots at said election and that the form of submission upon the ballot shall be as follows.

For election of county assessor.....
Against election of county assessor....

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10918 Cobbeys Statute for the year 1911.

Seconded by L. F. Schmidt. The vote on said resolution was: Aye. Chaplin, Schmidt, Hummel, Ohmstede. No. None.

Resolution declared carried and so ordered by Chairman Ohmstede.
