## BIG SAVING IN FUEL

IMPROVEMENTS AT THE STATE SCHOOL AT BEATRICE

### **GOSSIP FROM STATE CAPITAL**

Items of Interest Gathered from Reliable Sources and Presented In Condensed Form to Our

Readers.

Extensive improvements which have been in the course of construction all summer at the state institution for feeble minded at Beatrice are nearing completion. E. J. Schurig, consulting engineer for the state work, says that the state will be able to make a big saving in fuel cost. Last January the coal bill for the institution was \$3,250. The heating plant was old and had been carelessly patched and tinkered with until it was at a low point of efficiency. There were many breaks in the big pipe lines in the tunnels. Great quantities of coal had to be burned before any results could be secured, and the system was altogether wasteful and extravagant During the past summer the heating system was thoroughly overhauled and rebuilt. The cost of the work was about \$10,000, and Mr. Schurig estimates that this amount will all be made up in savings of fuel cost for the coming winter.

Fire Commissioner's Rival.

An old soldier of Lincoln, William Orr by name, is a rival of State Fire Commissioner C. A. Randall and following each and every fire in the state takes fully as great an interest in the affair as does the state official. Randall gets his pay from the insurance companies, spends what he wants to and turns the remainder over to the state. Orr gets nothing unless those to whom he writes desire to know the origin of all fire and the secret of that agency. The latter's usual charge is \$15 for the secret. Sometimes it is paid and sometimes it is not. Usually the letters are forwarded to the state department and the matter ends there. Mr. Orr does not believe that many fires are the acts of incendiaries and for the sum mentioned he promises to disclose the real cause.

New Buildings for State University. If the state will enter into a contract with the city of Lincoln whereby at least \$100,000 will be expended annually in the erection of new buildings at the state university downtown campus, the city will in return purchase the property needed for campus

The telegram of the local president was sent after more than forty Greeks had come to him to find out if there were such need for them in the Greek army as to justify them in starting at once.

Governor Issues Proclamation. Under date of October 5, Governor Aldrich has issued a proclamation announcing that on Tuesday, November 5, a general election will be held in Nebraska for the election of state officers, the list beginning with governor, also congressmen and members of the legislature, and for an expression of preference for United States senator, and also for or against five proposed amendments to the state constitution.

Want It Spelled With an "O." Protesting against the spelling of the name Monroe, citizens of that place have filed a complaint with the state railway commission asking that the Union Pacific railroad officials be compelled to change from "Munroe" to "Monroe." The commercial club of the little town takes the matter very much to heart according to the communications forwarded to state officials, and the merchants declare that the reformed spelling of the word should be stopped at once by action of the railway commissioners.

New State Building.

Land Commissioner Cowles reports the completion of a new laundry building at the asylum at Hastings. The building cost \$20,000. It is 126x142 feet, all on one floor of cesulted to the case. MISSION TO THE GENTILES.

LESSON TEXT-Mark 7:24-30 and Mat-GOLDEN TEXT-"Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out."-John 1:37.

Chronologically the incident of the centurions servent precedes that of the Syrophenician woman, though we will look at them in the order suggested. The one incident occurs near he border of Tyre and Sidon, probably about May or June, A. D. 29, and the other in Capernaum during the summer of A. D. 28. Both are incldents in the life of Jesus that have to do with his ministry as the Hebrew Messiah to those who were outside of the pale of Judaism.

At the beginning of Mark's record (v. 24) we have a wonderful suggestion as to the strain of Jesus, ministry and the accompanying lesson that rue righteousness cannot be hid, it speaks for itself.

There are four uses of the word 'answered" in Matthew's record of his incident (Matt. 15:21-28) that are suggestive. Let us first, however, get he setting. This woman was a Greek -a Gentile; by race she was a Syrophenician, that is, a Canaanite. Thus she was a descendant of that race whom God, by the hand of Joshua, had driven out to make room for the Hebrew nation, and as such is under the ban of God. See Eph. 2:12. Yet this woman reaches Jesus, her trouble being that her daughter is possessed by an unclean spirit. At her approach she takes a lowly place at Jesus' feet and requests that he heal the child. She calls him the "Son of David," and "He answered her not a word." Matt. 15:23. She had no claim upon him as the Meseiah. This was the wrong footing, for she was not a child of the kingdom. It was her need that drove her to him. How she had heard of him is suggested in Mark 3:8 and 7:24, cf. Rom. 10:17. There are some question that silence will not answer. 
