



84 x 84 feet on the ground. The build ing will be finished up in modern style, provided with heat, plumbing and ventilation. The basement will contain County Surveyor's room, County Superintend-

ent's room, ladies toilet room, gents toilet room, historical room, four storage vaults, vault for County Superintendent, vault for County Surveyor and Sheriff's entrance. First Floor will tentsin County

Freasurer's room with vault, County Clerk's room with vault, future County Recorder's room with vault, Probate Court room and County Judge's room, with vault, County Commissioners' room and Abstract room.

The second story wid contain two lury rooms, County Attorney's room, with vault, County Sheriff's room, Elerk of the District Court's room with vault, two witness rooms, Judge of the District Court, District Court room to seat about 250 people, there will be ladies and gents toilet room for second floor corridor, also provide toilets for each jury room and the Judge of the District Court.

The style of the building is carried out in Colonial design, cut of which will show for itself.



According to the bulletin of the federal bureau of labor the average price of a dosen or more of the principal ar-ticles of food has increased 50 per cent

The price of flour has increased 39 per cent, lard 55 per cent., steak 59 per cent, hams 61 per cent., cornmeal 63 per cent., rib roast 63 per cent., round steak 84 per cent., pork chops 36 per cent., bacon 96 per cent., and Irish potatoes 11 per cent.
