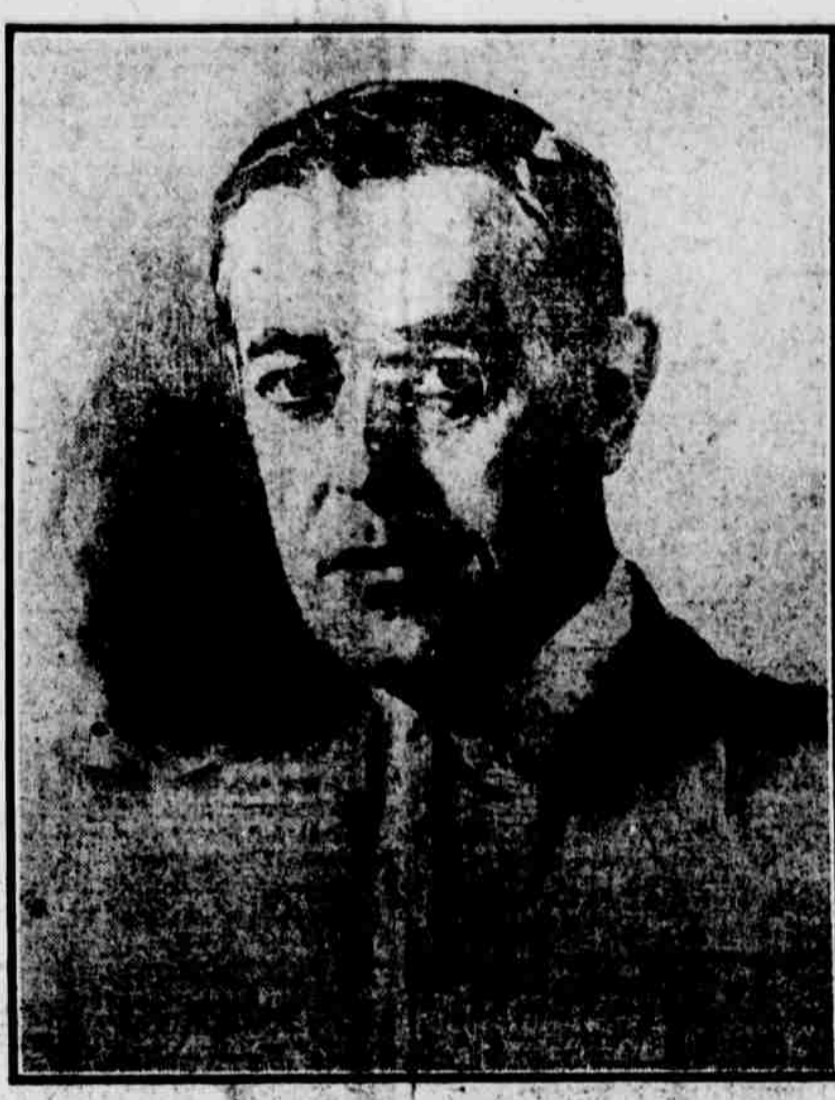

Tuesday's election revealed a great landslide to Wilson and the Democratic principles. Not since the nation was organized has a man received so many electoral votes as Wilson secured this year. Two years ago the people voiced their discontent with the manner in which the party in power disregarded platform promises by electing Democratic candidates to Congress. This year they practically made it unanimous.

Our Next President

President Elect Woodrow Wilson conducted a clean wholesome campaign which made its appeal direct to the hearts of the voters. His great endorsement shows that the people believe in him. We can expect some real constructive legislation from the Democratic party and we are unquestionably entering on an era of general prosperity.

In the Nebraska state election the good old commonwealth again swung back into the Democratic fold. The voters preferring to take their chances with men who know what they think and are not afraid to express their convictions rather than to again experiment with straddlers. At this time it looks like the election of all the Democratic state candidates except Shallenberger.

Webster county is republican and progressive by an average majority of one hundred. All the republican candidates carried the county except the head of the ticket and Stewart, Schmidt and (the fellow who ran against Harmon) Wilson carried the county by two hundred seventy nine over Roosevelt. Taft was a bad third.

This is a great victory and the Democratic party is mindful of the responsibility placed upon it. There is no question about the change being beneficial. The battle is over and it now
