### Commissioners Hold Meeting

The county commissioners met last Tuesday, January 14th, with Commissioner Hoffman having taken the place of Commissioner Schmidt and Commissioner McCall filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Senator Hummel.

Paul Storey was elected chairman of the board for the ensuing year.

County Assessor Butler was allowed not to exceed \$200 for clerk hire, at the rate of \$3 per day for time employed.

The following bridge committees were appointed.

The county assessor was instructed to attend the county assessor's meeting at Lincoln, February 4th and 5th, with necessary expenses allowed.

In the matter of the double assessment of the improvements on es sei sec. 21-1-11 in the sum of \$1000 actual value, the tax was ordered refunded to John E. Fox.

It was ordered that the county clerk present all claims allowed by the board to the county treasurer for endorsement as to amount of taxes due and unpaid, which tax shall be deducted from amount of claim, or a warrant be drawn to be applied on taxes.

The request of the county superintendent for a rural telephone in her office was refused.

The county treasurer was instructed to strike from tax record, taxes in the sum of \$5.93, against Josephine and Dora Dosee on mortgage which was paid in fall of 1911.

An erroneous tax of \$11.87 against Chas. Lepin of Blue Hill on mortgage taken simply as security for notes signed by Lepin as security, was ordered struck from the records.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That no bridge be built in Webster county during the year 1913 except with the approval and by the direction of a majority of the entire board of county commissioners.
