Big Crops in Nebraska

Some Record Yields From the Farms

The State Board of Agriculture has been looking up some of the extraordinary crop yields of 1912 and finds remarkable crops in many parts of the state: T. N. Feltz of Furnas County raised the banner crop of oats in western Nebraska so far as heard from, his yield being 91 bushels and 21 pounds per acre from 6.73 measured acres Glen Wilson of Washington County harvested an average of 55 bushels of oats from a field of eight measured acres.

Alex Buschow of Webster County produced 55 bushels of Turkey Red winter wheat per sore from a field of about ten acres with other larger fields which came near the same high mark. Mr. Buschow keeps alfalfa in his rotationfand his biggest yield of wheat followed alfalfa.

What is probably a record yield of wheat for Nebraska in recent years comes from Merrick County, where Will McCullough threshed 143 bushels from two scree reserved for a test; this is at the rate of seventy-three and onehalf bushels per acre. Yields of thirty-five to forty bushels of wheat per acre are so common as to no longer excite comment. The fitness of Nebrasks soil for the growing of winter wheat of good quality is shown by the fact that the average yield for ten years is twenty-five per cent greater than that of Kansas, whose big wheat crops have been given nation wide publicity.

The sixteen boys winning prizes in the annual corn growing contest of the State Board of Agriculture averaged eighty-four bushels per acre. These examples, taken from widely separated portions of the state, indicate the possibilities of Nebraska soil under skiltful management.

Farm Prosperity In The Apple Belt.

Much comment has been given to Nebraska's big apple crop of 1912. The six counties of Butler, Gage, Johnson, Nemaha, Otos and Richardson produced 3,832,690 bushels of apples, according to the figures returned by the Bureau of Industrial Statistics; this is equivalent to 6,665 carloads of apples, the bulk of which went to eastern markets. One grower sent two carloads direct to London, England, at a fancy price. These same six counties produced grain, hay and putato crops to the amount of \$16,488,389 in 1912; this is equivalent to one-third of the values of the same crops for the entire state of Washington; it is equal to onehalf of the values of these crops for either Oregon or Idaho and one-fourth of the value of these crops for the big state of California. These same countain swipe which total one half as many head as either Idaho, Washington or Oregon and nearly one-sixth as many as California.

Omaha Show Decorations Will Be The Best Ever

Omaha, Nebr., Jan. 28th.—Elaborate decorations, in which green will be the predominating color, will greet the eyes of visitors to the Omaha Automobile show, which will be fheld here in the Auditorium the last week in February. In past years, the management has not given special attention to decorations but this year, they will be made the feature of the event.

The decorations have been given over to a professional who will have entire authority. He has been given instructions to make the Auditorium a palace of beauty so that it will appeal to every Nebraska dealer who attends the show.

The lighting scheme will be entirely different from any ever before used. Thousands of electric lights will radiate in every direction. Chandeliers will be covered with natural greens with white lights peeking through. Electrical lamps will rise out of mounds of palms. The effect will be dazzting.
