to Talk at Omaha Show

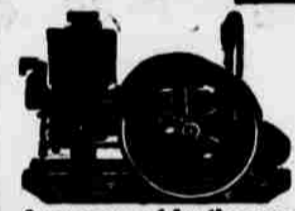
Omaha, Neb.,—Jan. 28th—Speakers of national reputation, who agreed to talk to Nebraska cement users during the convention and show of the organization, which will be held in Omaha, Feb. 4 to 8, include A. J. R. Curtis of Chicago, Alfred S. Johnston of Chicago, C. C. Merrilat, Winfield, Ia., L. W. Chase, Nebraska University, R. T. Woodward, Owatonna, Minn., and A. N. Johnson, state highway engineer of Illinois.

Mr. Johnson will speak on "Paving Public Highways", a topic of especial interest to Nebraskans at this time in view of the agitation throughout the state for permanent roads. "Concrete Silos" is the subject which Mr. Chase will handle. He will show that from an economic standpoint, the building of silos will more than repay twice fold the expenses of the installation.

A feature of the show, which has been provided by President Palmer and Secretary Whipperman, is the daily illustrated lectures on the stage. These lectures will be given by J. B. Curtis. The slides to be used are said to be the finest that are possible to secure. This feature alone will be worth a trip to the show, which is the only one to be held west of the Mississippi River this year.
