City attorney reported on collections referred to him.

Moved by Charley Strong and seconded by Cowden, that Morhart Bros. claim be allowed for \$14.28 be allowed for \$1.78 and balance \$12.50 be applied on their electric light license, said Morhart to comply with ordinance before license is issued. Carried.
