



This administration abolished the ten per cent reduction on bills for light and water and thus saved a snug 22, 1913 at 1 p. m. sum for the city. The city is now paid for what it furnishes to consumers. By relieving the Commissioner of the duties of making out statements and collecting the bills he is now able to devote his entire time for the up-keep of the light and water system-this is a big advance over former methods.

This administration succeeded in connecting the Maurer springs with our city water supply at a time when those springs seemed to be lost. This result was accomplished without the expenditure of one dollar of city funds. Monthly statements of the financial condition of the city have been regularly published and by keeping these by themselves any city could tell just what was being done with the money. This administration has not indulged in the luxury of quarrels and deadlocks. Business has been transacted in a business like manner, each member of the council has spoken his opiuion freely and the result has been

beneficial to the city. This administration has paid off about four thousand dollars of previous indebtedness and have paid their own bills from time to time so that we are now practically out of debt. There may be a hundred dollars but the amount is inconsiderate. We have dreamed for years of the time when the city would be out of debt and now that our dreams are to be a reality we should endorse the acts of the business council by retaining them in power.

The second, reason why we favor the business men's ticket is because in this election there is absolutely no issue between the two tickets.
