This Town Needs Rain

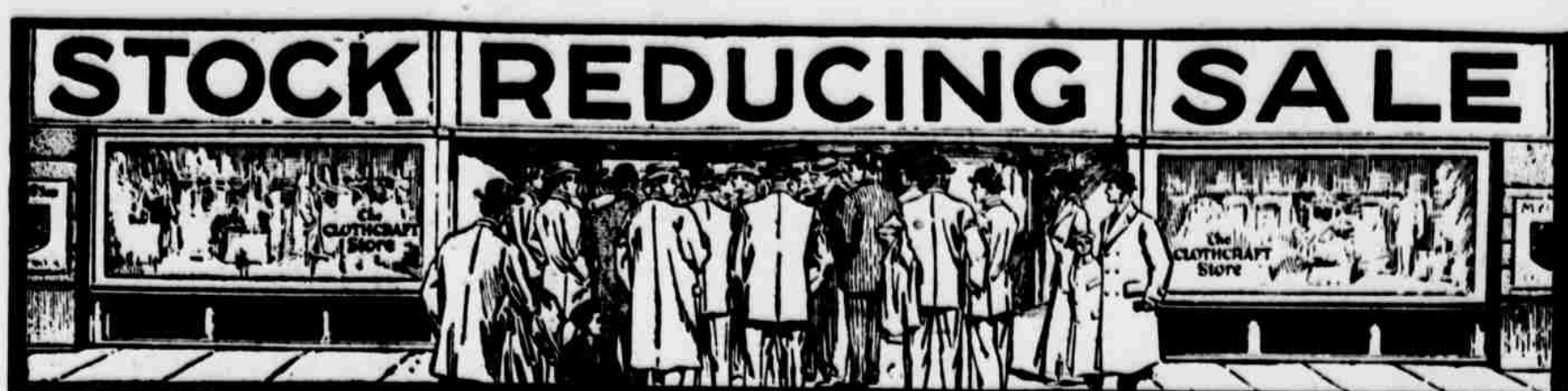

Mrs. H. J. Garber Laid To Rest

(Read at the funeral by Rev. John Williams, pastor of the Guide Rock Christian Church.)

Hannah J. Jewell was born in Washington, County, Pennsylvania April 25, 1839.

When she grew to woman's estate, she married Mr. Abram Garber, at Elkader, Iowa, on September 23, 1860. They were the parents of two children, Ida F. and Edwin, both of whom are well known in this community.

Less than ten years later, they came west with their children to Nebraska, and in 1870 Mr. Garber homesteaded the quarter section on the north east side of Guide Rock. Guide Rock however, was not then on the map. Thus it happened that the Garber family were among the very early settlers here, passing through the struggles and triumphs of the pioneers.

Mr. Garber died twenty years ago, and Mrs. Garber has resided here since then, living for years past with her daughter, Mrs. Ida F. Hayes. One sister of the deceased lives in Guide Rock. Mrs. Fannie R. Cray, there is also one brother, Mr. James

S. Jewell, of Yuma, Colorado, who was prevented by sickness from attending the funeral. There are three grandchildren, two of whom are living.

It was in the Sixties, while Mrs. Garber was still a young woman with the growing cares of her family before her, that she made profession of her faith in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. She was baptised in Iowa and became a member of the Christian church. When the family moved here there being at that time no organization of the Christian church in this vicinity, Mrs. Garber cast her lot with the Baptist church. To this sacred profession she remained faithful to the end, falling asleep in Jesus on Thursday afternoon, July 10, 1913.

Mrs. Garber was never robust physically. The battle of life often proved a severe strain upon her strength of body. But her mind was bright, and her spirit strong, her disposition also was tender and true. And so, although not possessed of great physical vigor, her life has nevertheless been a busy and useful one. She was a friend of the needy. It can be said of her, now that she is gone, that her sympathetic heart had a keen affinity for suffering. Her ear was quick to catch the sigh of distress; her feet speedy on errands of relief. She lived an active life, and a good life, and a long life.

For the last eighteen months she herself has been a sufferer. Unable any longer to help others, she has had to surrender herself to the help of others, and they have made her pillow as smooth and her pain as easy as human love or kindness can do.

Her vitality persisted in spite of many troubles and prolonged ailments, until finally, wearied with this world and longing for rest, she closed her eyes upon the changing scenes of earth, reaching the end of her journey, to find in the end, we are quite assured, rest, and rewards, and reunions and everlasting joys.

Her memory will be cherished by many outside of her kindred, who will think of her with esteem and grateful respect, and where the remembrance of this upright woman is cherished, we do not doubt that it will be an encouragement in trouble, a help when burdens are heavy, and a sweet influence for good at all times.
