Equalization Board

Holds Short Session

RED CLOUD, NEB., August 13, 1913.

Board of Equalization met pursuant to call of County Clerk. Members present—T. J. Chaplin, G. Ohmstede, Floyd McCall, W. G. Hoffman, J. O. Butler and Paul Storey Chairman of said committee.

On motion the levy was made against assessed valuation of all taxable property in the several school districts as follows:

On motion the following levies were made upon all the taxable property of Webster County, Nebraska, for county purposes for the year 1913, viz:

General Fund, 4 mills on the dollar.

Bridge Fund, 4 mills on the dollar.

Road Fund, 3 mills on the dollar.

The matter of the petition asking for a levy of 4 mills for the year 1913, 1914 and a sufficient levy for the year 1915 which added to previous levies will raise the sum of \$60,000.00 to be used for the erection of a court house coming on for hearing.

Upon due consideration we find that there are 1581 signers to said petition, that said signatures are genuine, that each of said signers is a resident voter of Webster County, Nebraska. That the average vote cast in Webster county for the years 1911 and 1912 was 2824 votes. That said petition is signed by more than 51 per cent of the voters of Webster County, Nebraska as shown by the average vote in said county for the years 1911 and 1912.

The following resolution was introduced by Commissioner G. Ohmstede:

Resolved that whereas more than 51 per cent of the resident voters of Webster County, Nebraska, to wit 1581 have signed a petition asking for a levy of 4 mills for 1913, 4 mills for 1914, an amount not exceeding 4 mills, for the year 1915 sufficient to raise the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a Court House on the present Court House grounds at Red Cloud, Nebraska. Therefore be it resolved that said petition be granted, that a tax of 4 mills be levied on all the taxable property in Webster County, Nebraska, for the years 1913, 1914 and a levy not exceeding 4 mills, which added to the amount raised by the two previous levies will raise the sum of \$60,000.00 for the year 1915. Said levies which added to other levies for county purposes not to exceed the sum of 15 mills.

The proceeds of such levies to be known as the "Special Court House Fund" and to be used only in the construction of court house, tearing down or removal of the present court house and improvements in the present court house grounds. The total cost of said court house finished, furnished and ready for occupancy to cost not to exceed the sum of \$60,000.00. Said court house to be erected upon the present court house grounds at Red Cloud, Nebraska.

That the Board of Commissioners proceed to accept plans and specifications for the new building, advertise for bids and let the contract as provided by law. Said resolution was seconded by Floyd McCall.

The roll call was taken which resulted as follows: Ayres—McCall, Hoffman, Ohmstede, Storey and Chaplin. Nays none. Motion carried.

On motion Board adjourned sine die.
