Commissioners' Proceedings

RED CLOUD, NEB., Aug. 13, 1913.

Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present—T. J. Chaplin, G. Ohmstede, W. G. Hoffman, Floyd McCall and Paul Storey Chairman of said Board.

Chairman Storey appointed McCall, Chaplin and Ohmstede to view n/2 Section 18-4-12 in regard to claim of excessive tax.

Moved and seconded that the Board investigate and measure up all bridges that have not been measured and accepted. Motion carried.

In the matter of the Sidney M. True claim for witness fees in the sum of \$44. Moved and seconded that said claim be and is hereby rejected. Motion carried.

On motion the County Clerk is hereby

authorized and instructed to draw a warrant on the General Fund in the sum of \$20.00 in favor of Rosie C. Bowling for the term of 6 months commencing Aug. 15, 1913 and on the 15th of each month thereafter until 6 warrants have been drawn in favor of said Rosie C. Bowling, by order of County Judge, in case of dependent children.

On motion the County Clerk is hereby authorized and instructed to draw a warrant on the General Fund in the sum of \$25.00 in favor of Louise Green for the term of six months, commencing August 15, 1913 and on the 15th of each month thereafter until 6 warrants have been drawn in favor of said Louise Green, by order of County Judge, in case of dependent children.

Moved by Floyd McCall that the County Clerk be and is hereby instructed to correspond with the state engineer and request him to come to Red Cloud or send a representative from his office to go with the Board and determine on what kind, style and size of bridges should be erected at places where bridges are in contemplation of being built and furnish plans and specifications for such bridges. Seconded by T. J. Chaplin. Motion carried.

On motion Board adjourned until August 14, 1913, 9 o'clock a. m.

August 14, 1913. Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Moved and seconded that Board pay not to exceed \$33.00 per thousand for bridge lumber and pay not to exceed 55 cents per sack for cement and that said Board visit all lumber and cement dealers whom they have been purchasing such materials and notify them of their action.

In the matter of unsafe bridge on section line between sections 18 and 19 Stillwater Precinct, as reported by Commissioner Chaplin. The Board recommended that a cement bridge 16 by 20 feet roadway be built on plans furnished by the State Engineer. Motion made by McCall and seconded by Ohmstede that the above be and is hereby the order of said Board. Motion carried.

In the matter of unsafe bridge on Section 2, Harmony Precinct, 3 miles west and 1 mile south of Bladen as reported by Commissioners McCall, Ohmstede and Storey it is recommended that whole Board investigate the said bridge on Monday, Aug. 18th., and arrive at a conclusion as to what type of bridge to place at this point. Also that in the matter of unsafe bridge on line between Section 16 and 17 Walnut Creek Precinct that it be and is hereby recommended that a cement bridge 12 feet long, 20 feet roadway with cement floor be built at this place on plans furnished by State Engineer. On motion by Chaplin and seconded by Ohmstede that the above be and is the order of the Board. Motion carried.

On motion the following claims were audited and allowed and the County Clerk authorized and instructed to draw warrants on their respective funds in payment of same.
