Citizens To Vote On Sewer System

On Tuesday evening the City Council met in regular session in the council chamber, with Mayor Saunders in the chair, and Councilmen Storey, Cowden, Fox and Crans present.

City Clerk, pro tem Geo. H. Overing, read the minutes of the previous and intervening sessions, which were approved.

The matter of the suit of the Bell Telephone Co., the complaint was laid over to another meeting for investigation by the city attorney, M. J. Munday.

The sewer system and plans were taken up at this juncture and fully discussed by the mayor and council, and after taking the matter up from all corners, a vote was called for as to whether the matter should be put before the people, and when Clerk Overing canvassed the vote it was found to have been unanimously carried and the election was called for October 14, 1913.

The report of City Treasurer Florence was read and filed.

The report of Police Judge Burden was read and approved. This was the first report ever made by a police judge in this city. The report was placed on file.

The application of Cliff Jay for raise in salary, was carried over until a future date for action.
