Booster Edition Called Off

The Chief announced a month or so ago its intention of putting out a special "Booster Edition" on September 18th. This special edition was to contain a full and complete history of the county, together with all the resources and occupations of the people of the county, as well as a general write up of this great state of Nebraska.

However, owing to the illness of the editor, and the consequent inability of him being able to secure special articles, we are forced to give up the contemplated edition at this time.

To put out an edition of this kind requires considerable time in order to secure the necessary data, etc., that is if the edition is up to a high standard, and as previously stated owing to illness, the editor has been unable to devote this necessary time to the cause. Hence we lay down, rather than to endeavor to put out an edition which would not reflect our best efforts, were we given sufficient time.

There is a total of 237 news papers, however, throughout the state who will next week put out their "Booster Edition" containing a complete write up of the state in a general way, as well as their particular community, and to these "Brethren Quill Pushers" the Chief wishes success, and trusts that they, as far as possible, make up for what we were unable to accomplish.

Changes Made In Newspaperdom

Several changes have been made lately in newspaperdom throughout the state. F. P. Shields, who for some time has published that old familiar pink sheet—Shield's Tamora Lyre—at Tamora, Nebraska, has purchased the Orleans Chronicle, at Orleans, Nebraska. Mr. Shields is a writer of considerable note, and the first edition of The Chronicle, under his management, has reached our desk, and it is easy to tell that the same hand and mind which has for years shaped the destinies of The Lyre, was now guiding The Chronicle.

The Superior Daily Journal which was purchased by W. S. Trites, last month, and which was heretofore published as an evening paper, has been changed to a morning paper, making its initial appearance, in its new gown, on Tuesday morning. Mr. Trites has clearly demonstrated his ability as a newspaper man, since taking charge of the paper, and during his short management has greatly improved its appearance, as well as placing it in a higher class from a news stand point.

Base Ball Tournament

Red Cloud base ball fans are this week enjoying a three day base ball tournament which began on Wednesday at 10:30, at which time the home team crossed bats with the Blue Hill team. Blue Hill winning the game by a score of 13 to 5. In the afternoon at 3 o'clock the same teams played another game which resulted in a victory for Red Cloud by a score of 10 to 5. They were both good games.

This morning at 10:30 Red Cloud plays the Otoego, Kansas team its first game, and at 3 o'clock this afternoon will play the same team a second game. The Otoego team has a good record and no doubt both of these games will prove to be good ones.

Tomorrow, Friday, at 10:30 a. m., and 3 p. m. Red Cloud meets the Orleans team. This team is considered one of the best in southern Nebraska, and the prospects are that our boys will have to put forth their best efforts if they win these games.
The weather has been ideal for base ball, the rain being sufficient to lay the dust, and to cool off the air, and if you have not as yet witnessed our boys perform on the diamonds you should not fail to take in one or all of these games. You will find that Red Cloud has some "real" base ball material, the like of which is not to be found in every town of this size.

Motion made and seconded that S. A. Green be and is hereby appointed Constable of Glenwood Precinct to fill vacancy created by the resignation of J. A. Denton Constable. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that E. J. Solomon be and is hereby appointed Justice of the Peace in and for Glenwood Precinct. Motion carried.

On motion the official bond of E. J. Solomon as Justice of the Peace in and for Glenwood Precinct was and is hereby approved.

In the matter of the Bridge to be built by McCall on Section 22 in Harmony Precinct. Board recommended that one of the steel bridges north of Inavale be moved to the above place across the Blue River and a cement ford be put in to replace the bridge north of Inavale.

Moved and seconded that the above recommend be acted upon and carried out by McCall. Motion carried.

In the matter of the claim filed by Ed Jones and A. M. Cook, for witness fees, State vs William Burden and Fred Glebe for violation of the Game and Fish Law, in the sum of \$14.00. It was moved and seconded that said claim be and is hereby rejected. Motion carried.

"Omaha and South Omaha Day," Friday saw fully 3,500 people from the Twin Cities on the grounds, each one decorated with badge and pennant.
