### TRIBUTE TO MAYOR GAYNOR

New York Pastors Pay Tribute to Memory of Mayor Gaynor-

American Refugees in Rebel Hands.

Washington.-With the tariff bill being completed and the currency bill under way in the house the present week in congress promises marked progress toward the inscribing on the statute books of the legislation pressed by President Wilson. The senate and house conferees settling points in the tariff bill in disagreement between the two houses, have made much progress. The house this week will take up the currency bill in detail.

#### Refugees in Hancy of Rebels.

Mexico City.-One hundred Americans, including a number of women and children, refugees from Torreon. are reported to have fallen into the hands of rebels while proceeding overland to Saltillo. The authorities at Saltillo decline to take the responsibility of sending a force to their rescue, fearing, they say, that the rebels might make an attack on the refugees, which possibly otherwise would be avoided.

PAID TRIBUTE TO GAYNOR.

#### Mayor Was Mentioned in New York Sermons.

New York .- From the pulpits of many churches Sunday tributes were paid in sermons and prayers to the memory of Mayor Gaynor. At a score of churches it was announced that sermons dealing with the life attainments of the late mayor would be preached next Sunday. These sermons will be delivered while the body of Mayor Gaynor lies in state at the city hall.

#### Veterans at Chattanooga.

Cattanooga, Tenn. - Headquarters for the forty-seventh annual national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic were opened here Saturday. When Commander-in-Chief Beers and the advance guard of veterans orrived here they found Chattanoiga smothered in bunting and as much enthusiasm over the old flag as they ever saw in any northern city. The G. A. R. has never had more complete arrangements made for its entertainment than this year by the state of Tennessee. All the citizens of Chattanooga. which is to be the first camping place of the union veterans in the old south. seem to have entered into generous rivalry to see who can spread the most bunting and contribute most to the entertainment of the visitors.

## Methodist Conference at Lincoln.

His shoulders and both legs were broken, his right foot crushed and partially amputated, and his head badly bruised and cut. Mr. Omsler was walking across the tracks toward the west, going to his home.

New York.-The body of a man killed August 31 at Pelham parkway by a New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad train, has been identified by several persons as that of "Big Tim" Sullivan, the congressman who has been missing from his brohter's home in Williamsbridge for two weeks. His mangled body was identified by his stepbrother, Larry Mulligan, after it had lain for thirteen days in a local morgue. Sullivan, who was ill, evaded his nurses early on August 31, and wa sstruck and killed by a train at Pelham parkway.

#### Body in State in Liverpool.

Liverpool.-The body of William Jay Gaynor lay in state Friday at the foot of the grand stairway of the town hall of Liverpool. It was an unprecedentmetropolis, for never before had anyone laid in state in the historic edifice. Covered with the stars and stripes and with the British union jack draped over its foot, the casket rested on a catafalque brought here from Westminster abbey, London, and on which has reposed the bodies of many of England's most famous men. It last was used at the funeral of Field Marshal Lord Wolseley in St. Paul's cathedral last March

## MONEY TO AID AMERICANS.

#### House Passes an Emergency Appropriation.

Washington .- In response to an urgent demand from the state department, the house has adopted a joint resolution making an emergency appropriation of \$100,000 to be used for the relief of destitute Americans in Mexico and for their transportation to the United States. Majority Leader Underwood presented the emergency resolution and read a personal letter from Secretary Bryan asking immediate action. The secretary said the department was using \$2,000 a day to aid Americans in Mexico, and that but \$12,000 was available for that purpose. The resolution will go immediately to the senate.

## Japan Demands Indemnity.

Peking.-Japan's demands growing out of the killing of several Japanese at Nanking have been presented to the Chinese government. Though full details were not aavilable, sufficient information was gleaned to show that the demands were tantamount to an ultimatum. An apology, an indemnity and the punishment of the guilty soldiers and officials at Nanking are required to accept the terms without delay and without bartering.

# TO INSPECT SCHOOLS

TAX COMMISSIONERS FIX DATES OF MEETING.

## **GOSSIP FROM STATE CAPITAL**

Items of Interest Gathered from Reliable Sources and Presented in Condensed Form to Our

Readers

Plans for inspection of high schools which are to benefit under the provisions of the Shumway act of the last legislature, were outlined at a conference held by State Superintendent Delzell, High School Inspector A. A. Reed, Principal H. E. Bradford of the state agricultural school, P. B. Barker of the agronomy department and Dean Burnett of the agricultural college. Nineteen schools in all have been designated to receive aid from the \$15,000 fund provided in the Shumway law. The amount each receives will depend upon the extent to which the work is undertaken in each institution. The schools which are to take up the fouryear agricultural courses are: Alliance, Alma, Aurora, Beatrice, Blair, Crete, Fairfield, Gothenburg, Hastings, Holdrege, Kimball county high school, O'Neill, Pawnee City, Red Cloud, South Omaha, St. Paul, Stromsburg, Tecum seh, Wahoo and York.

#### Claim Allowance Too Small.

Only about 40 per cent of the volume of water claimed by the Kearney Water & Electric Power company as the amount which it is entitled to take from the Platte river has been allowed by the state board of irrigation. In a set of findings prepared by State Engineer Price, which the board adopted, the Kearney company is given authority to divert 140 cubic feet per second for power purposes and 22 cubic feet for irrigation. In its application filed with the board last December, the company asked permission to take 400 cubic feet per second for power and 35 cubic feet for irrigation. The company claims that its needs are measured by these figures and it will probably appeal from the allowance made by the board as inadequate.

#### Tax Commissioners Make Dates. Members of the state tax commis-

sion have fixed the first and third Fridays of each month as regular meeting da.es for the body. Special gatherings will be held from time to time on the call of the chairman or upon a unanimous demand from the other members. The work of future meetings is to be sub-divided into sections and different subjects are to be considered at each meeting. On September 19 the commission will hear representatives of the various insurance companies of the state give changes which they believe should be enacted in the laws governing the taxation of such concerns. During the state bankers' meeting the problem of bank taxation will be given and problems affecting counsors and county commi ers will be taken up at the state gatherings to be held here in January.

## Will Pay All Expenses.

"The Nebraska state fair will pay out," declared Secretary Mellor of the state agricultural board after officially reviewing the receipt and expense account of the big exhibition. "We have made few permanent improvements during the year and although our actual expense list was just as large as ever, we believe that we will not lose a cent by reason of the decreased attendance. We are glad we drew the crowds that we did. The big showing made the final day through the efforts of our Omaha and South Omaha people was what told the tale of loss or gain for this year. If they had fallen down on us we would have been up against it. As it was, their aid made Friday the best day we have ever had in the history of the state fair."

Miss Minnie Murphy of Humboldt has been recommended by Warden Fenton of the state penitentiary for the matronship of that institution. The board of control will fill the place within a short time. Promulgation of a rule by the board prohibiting employment of more than one relative of an institution head caused the resignation of Mrs. Fenton, who has been acting as matron since the first of the vear.

The supreme Tribe of Ben Hur has filed an application in federal court asking for a permanent injunction against the insurance code law which went into effect in July. The petition asks that John H. Morehead, governor of the state of Nebraska, Grant G. Martin, atorney general; William B. Howard, auditor of public accounts, and Lawson G. Brian be permanently enjoined from enforcing any of the provisions of senate file 364, or from performing any of the duties of the board of insurance commissioners created by this law.

## Drouth was Costly.

The dry weather will cost the state considerable money, according to Henry Gerdees, of the board of control. As an example, he said the state has 265 shoats at the Kearney industrial school for boys and there is not a grain of corn on the land of the institution to feed them. All the corn raised there has been cut up and put into a silo. There are 150 head of cattle at the institution and some of the stock must be disposed of or the state must buy low priced core
