School Board Holds Meeting

Red Cloud, Neb., Oct. 6, 1913. Board met in regular session. Members present—Storey, Turnure, Creighton and Coon.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Superintendent reported school attendance as follows—Kindergarten 69, 1st grade 47, 2nd grade 42, 3rd grade 39, 4th grade 35, 5th grade 29, 6th grade 50, 7th grade 40, 8th grade 40. Total for the grades 382. High school enrollment—9th grade 67, 10th grade 54, 11th grade 35, 12th grade 34. Total for High school 192.

Superintendent recommended the employment of an assistant Kindergarten teacher in order that the grade may be put on whole day session. The present enrollment being too large for one teacher to handle.

Upon motion the Teachers' Committee and the Superintendent were instructed to employ an assistant.

Upon motion it was ordered that children who were irregular in attendance in the Kindergarten should be excluded from school until the spring term commencing April 1, 1914.

Moved and seconded that the chair appoint a committee of one to confer with the Gaston Music Co., and procure at reasonable prices second hand organs, one for each grade in the Lincoln building. Carried. Chair appointed Fred Turnure.

Upon motion the Superintendent was instructed that if he deemed it advisable to permit the school to participate in the Farmers Institute parade.
