Getting In Bad

J. R. DUNCAN Nebraska Harticulture

The ther day I saw something that I do . t like to ser because it either s ws short-sightedness or carelessness. I went over to a grocery not far from my home and bought some Nebraska Jonathans because I like the flavor of them better than any apple grown either east or west. I saw the inch rainfall; 6 foggy mornings; ungrocer open up the barrel when it was usual number of cloudy days, delivered by the wholesale house to the grocery. The barrel was marke i No. 1 and cost the grocer \$1.50 per barrel. Upon removing the lid from School Board the face end of the barrel and examining the face layer we were not able to find an absolutely perfect apple to that layer. They ranged in size from two and one-fourth inch in diameter to 3 inches and from one-fourth color to full color. On removing the face layer we found apples from one and three-fourths inches in diameter to three inches in diameter, apples with worm holes in the end, worm holes on the side and several rotten specked ones, apples with scarcely any color and very few that would grade strictly No. 1's if standard pack was used.

These apples were sold to the grocer as No. 1 apples and were grown and that private and public property had packed by one of our large orchardists hey did in years gone by? I don't ing the present school year. think that every No. 1 barrel that goes the buyers of the east want our apples standing reward of \$25.00 to any person and will pay a premium to get the giving information leading to the arrest better grades They know that Ne, and conviction of any person or persons baska apples properly packed and guilty of forcing an entrance into the graded will keep better in storage and have a better flavor and appearance than apples grown in any other sect ion, Our own consumers are not 1914. acquainted with this fact because they have not had the opportunity to decide for themselves. Our growers complain that the home dealer won't pay as much as the eastern buyer and yet our consumers have to eat western box apples or New York apples and pay a high price for them or culls taken from our better grades that are shipped out of the state. Can you blame the home dealer from turning down the home grown apple and buying a box apple when he knows that every apple in that box is the same as every other apple and he can figure exactly what he can sell the apples for and his profit on them. ' Can he do that with he average Nebraska growers pack? The Nebraska grower is standing in his own light when he puts up a pack of apples and calls them first grade and they contain seconds and third grade apples in the same barrel. Better to standardize the pack and then hew strictly to the line and when your name goes on a barrel and you call it No. 1 see to it that it is strictly that. How do you expect a good reputation for your fruit and to get the top prices that Nebraska fruit is entitled to when it is properly graded and packed?
