The widow and children are left to mourn an affectionate husband and a kind father.

Mr. Walker removed to this city about two years ago. While not a member of any church, he was a regular attendant upon the services of the Christian church-and was exemplary in his conduct and morals.

In his youth he was the best allaround athlete in the county. Of stalwart frame he could jump farther and run faster-than any body else-and he combined an extraordinary measure of strength with his suppleness and activity. In his early manhood he taught school-and was an especially successful and proficient teacher of vocal music. He was one of the few men whom we have heard who could render the old ballards with true dramatic and musical art.

Last September he was the victim of paralytic stroke-which finally resulted in his death Dec. 19, 1913. The burial services were held from the Christian church Dec. 20, 1913, Rev. Hummel officiating.

A sister Mrs. Frank Smelser and a brother A. T. Walker survive him. An elder sister, Mrs. Lester and his parents died in this city several years ago. Mr. Walker will be gratefully re-
