THE LAST LEGS.

The City Council Hold an Adjourned Meeting. City Vote will be Convulsed This Evening.

The common council met in adjourned session last evening. There were present Councilmen Daily, Kaufmann, Roddy, Stephenson, Thiesman and Mr. President.

The clerk read a petition from certain property owners asking permission to put a pump at No. 614 South Sixteenth street and binding themselves to keep it in order.

Mr. Dally also opposed the petition on the ground that the bond was imperfect, and also for the reasons advanced by Mr. Stephenson.

Mr. Dally thought the gentleman's insult gratuitous and believed it would take him six months to count the vote referred to. He thought the gentleman had some ill feeling because he was not counted in.

A communication was read from the city attorney certifying that a judgment had been rendered by Justice Powell in the case of Mildred E. Rogers vs the city of Omaha, for \$30 and costs of \$2.30, and recommending that the amount be paid.

The city physician's monthly report was read, which contained the following facts. Deaths 54, of which 11 were in the First ward, 12 in the second, 3 in the Third, 4 in the Fourth, 4 in the Fifth, 19 in the Sixth, and one in the hospital. Of the above number 21 were married and 33 single.

Some discussion took place on the quit claim deed to the city of Omaha of the alley in the block to be occupied by the new elevator. Referred to committee on public property and improvements.

An appropriation ordinance for the month of March was passed and the council adjourned at 7 o'clock this evening, when they will convene the next evening.

UP RIVER GORGES.

A Belief That the Most Damaging Flood is Yet to Come.

Major Furay's Experiences in the Flooded Regions.

Major John B. Furay, special agent of the Post Office Department, returned Tuesday from St. Helena, Dakota, where he had been on special business with which the flood swept condition of the country materially interfered.

At Sioux City he states that the people are greatly excited and fear a most disastrous flood, which will sweep all the lower portion of the city.

Some business houses goods have been reserved for the basements. Many families living near the river have moved from their dwellings, and the railroad companies have all their cars ready to move at a moment's notice.

After the explorers had left the following telegrams passed between Mayor Smith and General Crook.

OMAHA, Neb., April 4, 1881. Mayor Smith: Have no appliances, dynamite or other suitable explosive, and can get nothing of the kind in Omaha.
