A PECULIAR CASE. In Which Poisoning Plays a Prominent Part. Special Dispatch to The Bee. SUTTON, Neb., June 18.—The coroner's jury in the Anderson-Johnson poisoning case, has issued a warrant for the arrest of Anderson, who appeared before Justice Lehigh for preliminary examination, and after hearing the case the prisoner was committed to the county jail without bail, to appear at the district court. The widow Mrs. Johnson, was held under heavy bonds to appear as a witness for the state.
