NEW MEDICAL COLLEGE.

Preparations Being Rapidly Made For Its Erection.

Its Location and the Character of the Building.

Last winter a number of city physicians inaugurated a preparatory school in this city for the benefit of young men hereabouts who desired to adopt the medical profession. The institution was known as the Nebraska School of Medicine and was thought of merely as an experiment.

The necessary routine work was gone about quietly, a suitable lot purchased and arrangements made to secure a charter under the general act, which grants the same privileges in Nebraska as a special act of incorporation does in other states.

Plans for the building have already been made and are now in the hands of the builders to secure the necessary estimates. The building will be a heavy frame structure two stories in height, and fifty-six feet front. It will include all the necessary rooms, including an amphitheatre, lecture rooms, dissecting rooms, chemical laboratory, library and faculty rooms.

In a short time additions will be built to the St. Joseph hospital so as to double its capacity. Arrangements have been completed with the managers of the hospital to hold clinics in that institution during the season of the college, thus providing for the pupils a practical demonstration of the treatment of diseases and injuries.
