THE STATE FAIR.

Proceedings of the Meeting of the Board of Managers.

The Grounds and Buildings Will be Lighted with Electricity.

The board of managers of the State Board of Agriculture held a meeting at the Withnell hotel, in this city, last evening.

There were present Hon. J. T. Clarkson, president, Gen. J. C. McBride, secretary; Hon. Christian Hartman, treasurer; Prof. A. D. Williams, Ex-Governor Furnas, Judge Kinney, Hon. Mark Dunham and Hon. G. W. E. Dorsey...

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Prof. Williams stated that the militia company of Sutton had reconsidered their former action...

Representatives of the Omaha jockey club stated that the grounds would be cleaned and put in proper condition for the occasion. Mr. Walker, who was present in behalf of the committee of the First M. E. church society...

After much discussion upon the matter and expressions of regret that there should be any misunderstanding in the matter, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, Under the law, the letting of the booth privileges for the state fair is placed under the control of the president of the state board of agriculture, and hence the board of managers has nothing to do with it...

The secretary stated that negotiations were completed for the agricultural society to join the Great Western circuit, and only awaited the action of the board of managers...

Resolved, That the board of managers of the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture is in favor of joining the Great Western fair circuit...

Resolved, That the races at the Nebraska state fair be governed by the national rules with the following proviso: Any record of any horse at any meeting prior to the Nebraska state fair meeting...

The secretary was directed to obtain suitable badges for the fair to that number and cost which he deemed proper.

The secretary read communications from Francis R. Bliz, of Chicago; Silbert's Aeronautical Bureau, of Chicago; and Messrs. Bright & Stark, of Mt. Airy, Iowa...

Upon motion the secretary was instructed to procure a suitable desk for his official use.

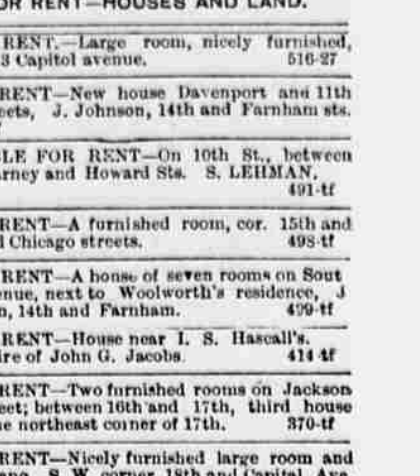

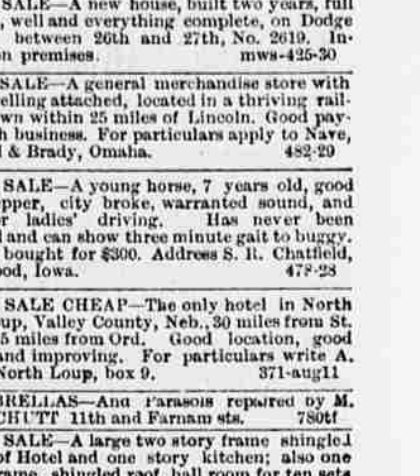

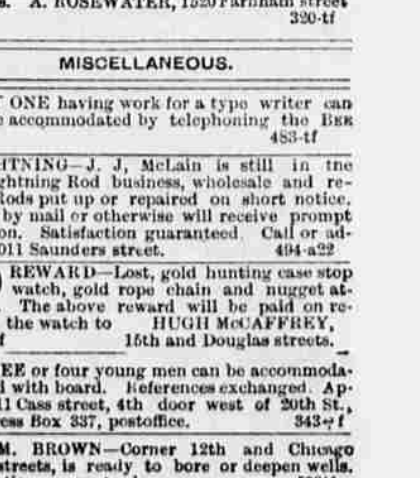
