The "Emily" in Port.

The government steamer "Emily," arrived in Omaha last night, and is tied up at the dock at the foot of Farham street.

The officers say that there is a good stage of water all the way up the Missouri at the present time, and that the river is comparatively free from "snags" and "bars."

The Emily will go to Ft. Benton for the purpose of removing obstructions in the shape of rocks and snags from the channel of the river.

She will operate between Ft. Benton and Fand Falls. A landing was rendered necessary at Omaha in order that some needed repairs in the boat's machinery might be made.

The boat is officered by Capt. John Justis and two mates, and is manned by a crew of twenty hardy-looking men.
