All That Exhibitors Have Asked for Transportation is Granted.

OFFICE OF BOARD OF MANAGERS, I OMARA, August 18, 1881. To Exhibitors for the State Fair:

As the impression is quite general in the state that the construction given to the so-called "railroad law," by the officers of the railroad companies, will require exhibitors to pay freight o and from the fair-contrary to the asual custom of only paying one way -I am authorized to say that exhibitrs will only be obliged to pay freight to the fair. The Nebraska state board of agriculture will pay return freight, on certificate of the secretary that the stock and articles were on exhibition.

In this connection it is exceedingly gratifying to state that the U. P. and B. & M. railroad companies, in the exercise of that liberal policy which had hitherto done so much to make the Nebraska state fair a success. have each tendered to the state board a donation in money, which will more than reimburse the board for the money it will pay out in returning the freight. The construction given to the railroad law, a construction sustained by very eminent lawyers, adopted by the companies after the most mature consideration, placed the board of managers in the most embarrassing situation. The managing officers of the U. P. and B. & M. companies were fully aware of this embarrassment, and seemed anxious to relieve it. Unless relieved, failure seemed inevitable. Exhibitors could not be expected to ship their stock-farmers would not send the fruits of the soil, if they had to pay freight both ways. Our fine cattle, horses, sheep and hogs, that have always been such an attractive feature at the state fair, would necessarily remain at home, and the coming fair be little clse than a failure. Such was the condition, and such the prospect when the U. P. and the B. and M. came to the rescue by awarding a donation which re-

ieves the board from all further anx-It is believed that the C. & N. W. will also manifest a similar spirit. Freight on all stock, merchandise produce and articles for exhibition at the state fair over the U. P. and its branches, and the B. & M. and its leased lines, will be paid to the fair by the exhibitor, and return charges will be paid by the state board. With these customary freight rates to exhibitors. it is believed that nothing now stands in the way of having the most attractive and successful fair ever held in

the western country.


