Latest army orders.—Celebration of July 4th.

Lieutenant-Colonel E. C. Mason, 4th Infantry, Acting Assistant Inspector General will proceed to Fort Niobrara, Neb., on public business; on completion thereof he will return to his station at these Headquarters.

In compliance with paragraph 3, Special Orders No. 142, current series from the Adjutant General's Office, Private George Emerson, General Service, U. S. A., will proceed without delay, to Whipple Barracks, Prescott, A. T., and report to the Assistant Adjutant General, Department of Arizona, for duty, the transfer to take effect July 1, 1883.

The Quartermaster's Department will furnish the necessary transportation, and the Subsistence Department commutation of rations for eight (8) days if being impracticable to carry cooked rations.

Within this Department, the 107th anniversary of the independence of the United States will, on the 4th proximo, be appropriately observed at all military stations. All military duty, excepting the necessary guard and police, will be suspended between reveille and tattoo; and the national salute will be fired as required by the regulations.

ON THE RAIL.

The New Fast Trains and Other Railway Intelligence.

The schedule which shortens the running time of passenger trains between Omaha and San Francisco went into effect at noon Sunday, when the overland train for Ogden pulled out at 12:05, ten minutes earlier than usual. This being the first one of the regular fast trains quite a number of employees and officials were at the depot to see it pull out, which it did precisely on time, the popular engineer, Jack Dolan, handling the throttle. It was a very long train in number of cars but light for travel. There were thirteen cars, three of which were sleepers. She was preceded by an engine running light to Grand Island to run in the local Grand Island and Omaha passenger train. The Denver train out Saturday night would also 13 cars, a portion of which were also for the new local train.

Omaha becomes a dining station again, and Messrs. Shears, Mupke & Swobe, proprietors of the dining hall, have enlarged it to accommodate the passengers. The trains which will stop here for meals are the Pacific Express, leaving at noon, the Atlantic Express arriving at 7:30 a. m., and the Lincoln train, leaving at 12:30 p. m. The Chicago & Northwestern Railway changes its time tables to connect with the Union Pacific fast trains. C. & N. W. trains will leave the transfer daily (except Sundays) at 9:40 a. m. and daily (except Saturdays) at 5:30 p. m. and also at every third Saturday evening. The time given is Chicago.

An extra-dummy train has been put on the Union Pacific bridge division, leaving Omaha at 10 p. m. for the transfer, and returning at 10:40 p. m.

The Missouri Pacific is again open for business out of Omaha. The first through train since the flood arrived here Saturday night. An immense amount of delayed freight came in, with more to follow.
