Inaugural Addresses.

HOW SOME PRESIDENTS HAVE INDULGED IN THE CLASSICS.

Gen. Taylor, when President, although the document was read and submitted to his Cabinet, had a sentence, which was subsequently altered in the printed documents, in which it was boastfully averred that our country "was at peace with all the world," and "had amicable relations with the rest of mankind."

The inaugural address of President Harrison, well written and with many excellent things in it, was so much devoted to English classics and to Roman history as to create much sport. It was a document like Gov. Dennison's, that one could safely swear by for there was nothing in it from the heavens or on the earth like it.

"It was a remark of a Roman Consul, in an early day of that celebrated Republic, that a more striking contrast was observable in the conduct of candidates for offices of power and honor, than in that of the latter case the pledges and promises made in the former. However much the world may have improved in many respects in the lapse of upwards of 2000 years since the remark was made by the virtuous and indignant Roman, I fear that a strict examination of the annals of some of the modern electoral governments would develop similar instances of violated confidence.

The President did this, no doubt, to pave the way for unavoidable breaking of promises made in the heat of a canvass. If the custom of breaking promises and pledges by candidates existed in Rome 2000 years ago, how faithfully it has been transmitted to the present generation! Again, the inaugural, in relation to political parties, says:

"It was the beautiful remark of a distinguished English writer that in the Roman Senate Octavius said a party divided the spoils, and to shout for one or the other, as those collected in Gaul or Egypt and the Lesser Asia would furnish the larger dividend. The spirit of liberty had fled, and avoiding the abodes of civilization, had sought protection in the forests of Scythia or Scandinavia, and under the operation of the same causes and influences, it will fly from our Capital and our forum. A calamity so awful, not only to our country, but to the world, must be deprecated by every patriot and every citizen to a state things like this, to produce it if not immediately checked. Such a tendency has existed—does exist."

And so on to the length of the entire inaugural, the good old man, for none doubt, Mr. Harrison's next good deed, was the drawing his illustrations from Roman history and English writers. The address was prepared at his home, and written at his leisure. A day or two before his inaugural, Daniel Webster had taken the Ex. book of interesting reminiscences of Webster, by his devoted friend and confidant, Harvey met Gen. Harrison and suggested to the President that he (Harrison) was overwhelmed with business. Mr. Webster checked out an hour and a half, and Mr. Webster had been selected for Secretary of State. The general replied that it was unnecessary, as he had already written. "Will you allow me to take it home and read it to-night?" asked Mr. Webster. "Certainly," said the President, "but let me take yours. So they exchanged documents. Next morning when Mr. Harrison said to Mr. Webster, "If I should read your paper instead of mine every body would say, 'This is the official paper and I propose to write, for I do not intend to interfere with my Secretary's part this is a sort of acknowledgment of the great honor they have conferred upon me in electing me to the Presidency, and although my inaugural is not so suitable as yours, still it is mine, and I propose to let the people have it just as I have written it. I must deliver my own inaugural."

When Mr. Webster found that the President was bent upon using his own inaugural (I quote from the book) Mr. Webster desired to modify it, and get in some things that were old, and as it then stood, he said it had no more to do with the affairs of the American government and people than a chapter in the Koran. Gen. Harrison reluctantly consented to let Mr. Webster take it, and he spent a large portion of the next day in modifying it. He was engaged to dine with Mr. Stanton, of the firm of Gates & Seaton, of the National Intelligencer, one of the warmest of Mr. Webster's admirers. When Mr. Webster came in Mrs. Stanton remarked to him, as he arrived late, that he looked fatigued and worried. Mr. Webster was sorry that she had waited dinner for him. "That is of no consequence at all," Mr. Webster said, "but I am sorry to see you so worried and tired. I hope nothing has gone wrong with your health, and I hope you have not had any more of those headaches." "You would think that something had happened if you knew what I have done. I have killed seventeen Roman Proconsuls as dead as smelts, every one of them!" That is, he had purged the inaugural of that many allusions to them. If the anecdote is true—Mr. Webster is its author—the inaugural of Gen. Harrison must have been a condensed edition of Gibbon's Rise and Fall of the Roman Empire instead of an inaugural of an American President—Cincinnati Enquirer.

Gymnastics as a Cure of Disease.

Boerhaave, the great Dutch physician, merited on the wall of his lecture-room, "I gave the medicine, God cured the disease." He was far in advance of the doctors of his era, and promulgated ideas which were then novel, but which science has since made common place.

In an age of dosing, when quantity was as much thought of as quality, he said: "When I reflect on the immensity of hardworking people from the effects of overeating and overfeeding, I cannot help thinking that most of our fashionable diseases might be cured mechanically, instead of chemically, by climbing a bitterwood tree, or chopping it down, if you like, rather than swallowing a decoction of its disgusting leaves."

Each schoolboy now knows that physical vigor is the basis of bodily health, and may only be retained by exercise. But in those days few physicians cared to utter such a truism, even if they themselves knew it. The ancient Greeks, knowing that an effeminate man is half sick, provided gymnastic exercises. They used these to promote health and prevent disease. An old Greek doctor, Asclepiades, is quoted as an authority by Dr. Oswald to enforce the idea that gymnastics will cure disease.

The philosopher had found that health could be preserved, and if lost restored, by physical exercise alone, and not only discarded the use of internal remedies, but made a public declaration that he would forfeit all claim to the title of physician if he should ever fall sick or die but by violence or extreme old age.

Asclepiades kept his word, for he lived upward of a century, and died from the effects of an accident. He used to prescribe a course of gymnastics for every form of bodily ailment.
