### THE COLORADO MASSACRE.

### Additional Details of the Murder of the Officers of Grand County.

Determined Pursuit of the Assassins -Other Shootings and Robberies.

DENVER, July 6. Later advices from

trand County develope the following facts. At the election in 1886 the people by a vote changed the county seat to Grand Lake. The matter was taken to the district court. Meanwhile the hatred existing between the two factions, growing in intensity, culminated in yesterday's bloody work. Grand county has three commissioners—Barney Day, A. G. Mills and E. P. Webber—a majority of whom in various cities and towns of the valley, will meet at St. Louis July 11, at the Southern Hotel.

The Tennessee state prison, with its convict labor, was leased to the Tennessee Railroad, Coal and Iron company for six years, at \$12,000 per annum.

(Day and Mills) were in favor of declaring the vote illegal that created Grand Lake the county seat, and removing the records back to Spring. Last Monday the commissioners had a regular meeting at Grand Lake. Just what was done is not known, but it is reported they decided to declare the office of the county treasurer vacant because of his refusal to tile a satisfactory bond. During the meeting Day, Webber and Dean, stopped at Mrs. Young's boarding house, a quarter of a mile around the head of Small lake. The road leading from Mrs. Young's to town is through thickets of small pines. Yesterday morning, just before 10 o'clock, the two commissioners and clerk started from the house to go to the place of meeting and finish up the business before finally adjourning. When about midway through the thicket three masked men suddenly sprang out of the bushes and commenced firing, shooting them all down almost inthe commissioners returned the fire, instantly killing one of the assassins. The other two masked men, thinking they had killed all three of the party, disappeared in the bushes. When appeared in the bushes. the startled citizens arrived at the place of combat, a moment later, they found Day dead, and Webber and Dean mortally wounded. They tore the mask from the other dead man and found he was Mills, the other county commissioner. The two other men are not known, Suspicion rests upon two noted desperadoes, Bill Redman and Len Coffin. When the news was brought to Hot Sulphur Springs it produced the very greatest stir and most intense excitement, and shortly before dark last night a party of twenty horse-men, well armed, left for Grand lake and a terrible fight is expected. Up to this hour (10 o'clock) no late news has been received from the scene of the tragedy. As a courier riding fifty miles over the mountains is the only means of communi-
