Inquiry revealed the fact that he was accompanied home by Mrs. Irey, having been married in Philadelphia, and his bachelor friends are thoughtfully smoking at his expense and wondering who will go next.

-The fire which broke out in South Omaha Sunday night was not in the last reported connected with J. E. Boyd's packing house, as at first reported but was in a small packing house just north of Mr. Boyd's, owned by J. Phillips Roe. It broke out in the smoking room where the meat is cured and was confined to that place by the efforts of the fireman. Only one stream was put on, by No. 2, as over 1,000 feet of hose had to be laid for that. Added to this, the route taken to reach the place was a terribly hard one and the department had to labor under many difficulties.

-The teamsters are raising a grand kick over the enforcement of the license law, which provides that every teamster or owner of a vehicle who does teaming or any kind of job work, shall pay a yearly license of \$10. We have it from good authority that if the license is collected by the authorities, all the teamsters in a body will turn in an expression, through whose prejudice the ordinance was passed. The teamsters claim that their earnings are much smaller than those of the expressmen and a teamster's charges range from \$2.50 to \$8.00 per day, while those of an expressman will reach some days \$10 and \$15.

-Mr. August Dorn, Secretary of the Nebraska Home and Cattle Insurance Company, is mourning the loss of a fine hunting dog, which was poisoned by someone, he thinks by the police. The dog was the pet of the neighborhood and aside from its money value was loved by the entire family, who felt highly indignant at the outrage. The question has been asked whether the police have a right to poison dogs indiscriminately and it is one that should be answered at once. The dog days have come and reports of animals going mad are received daily by telegraph, though none is yet reported in this city. Some rules and regulations should be adopted to preserve the lives of valuable dogs and there would be cure enough left to practice on.

ELECTRICAL ENTERPRISE.

A New and Important Company Organized in Omaha.

Which Will Cover the West With Telegraph and Telephone Wires.

Articles of incorporation of the "American District Telephone Company of Nebraska" were filed in the office of the county clerk to-day. Omaha to be its principal place of transacting business.

The object is a treble one: First, to build, establish, maintain, operate, lease, purchase or otherwise acquire and use telegraph systems within Nebraska, Iowa, Utah, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho. Second, to establish and maintain systems of messenger service for carrying and delivering messages, packages, etc., in cities and towns within the territory above named. Third, to manufacture and deal in telephonic, telegraphic and other electrical apparatus and supplies.

The capital stock is for the present fixed at \$50,000 in shares of \$100 each, which may be increased to \$100,000. The existence of the corporation shall terminate in 1933.

The highest indebtedness at any one time incurred at any one time, shall be \$10,000.

A board of five directors will manage the affairs of the corporation, from which shall be chosen a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The incorporators are John J. Dickey, Louis H. Korty, Flemon Drake, L. M. Riehem and M. H. Goble.

TOM HENDRICKS.

The Great Bourbon Statesman of Indiana on His Way West.

Hon. Thomas A. Hendricks, or "Tom" Hendricks, as he is more familiarly known in the Hoosier state, arrived in Omaha Sunday morning and was the guest during the day of his brother-in-law, Mr. Samuel Herman, of the Union Pacific.

Mr. Hendricks is known all over the country and is one of its ablest and most respected political men, although a Democrat, having been on the presidential ticket with Mr. Tilden eight years ago. His home is in Indianapolis where he practices law and occasionally runs for office. He has filled the highest offices in the gift of the people of that state and may yet reach the White house, if the Democrats should ever come into power. He is one of the finest stump speakers in this country and is popular at home with both Republicans and Democrats, although Republicans never vote for him as he was too radical a Bourbon during the war.

Mr. Tilden is on his way to Salt Lake City, for which point he left on Monday night. He will then go to Montana, his trip being on legal business and expects to close his trip by taking in the Yellowstone park.

In company with Mr. Hendricks on his trip are Col. E. B. Martindale and Judge Wright, also of Indianapolis. The former is a leading Republican politician, a wealthy man and for many years editor and proprietor of the Indianapolis Journal, the leading paper in that state.
