The Prospective Strike of Telegraph Operators.

St. Louis, July 11.-It was asserted here to-day on good authority that the executive committee of the Brother hood of Telegraphers held a meeting at New York last Monday, at which they discussed the grievances of the brother-hood, and formulated a demand for redress of them, which will be presented to general managers or the officials of the Western Union next Monday. If this company figures after presentation it is alleged a strike will be inaugurated and every member of the brotherhood quit work. This executive committee is composed of one representative of each of the seven districts into which the brotherhood is divided and is said to have absolute power to act in this matter.
