The condition of the census crop of 1879 in August was 99 and the yield 28 bushels per acre. The returns indicate the yield will not be much over 25 bushels per acre or 1.700.000.000 bushels, which have been too cool for rapid development and the crop is late. Fears are expressed that frost may yet cause a disaster. In August, 1874, the condition was one degree higher than the present average. The crop is late from wet spring and local summer droughts and the yield will be less than 21 bushels per acre. The averages by states of princi-pal production, are, Illinois 86, Indiana 95, Ohio 89, Michigan 68, Kentucky 97, Missouri 83, Kansas 97, Iowa 85, Nebraska 84, Wisconsin 85. Spring wheat-The average of condi-

tion of spring wheat for August 1 is 97, the same as 1882, but higher than for any previous August since 1875. In the crop. In the southern and southwestern counties the condition is 90. The prospect in Minnesota favors a crop of 131 bushels per acre, notwithstanding the bad weather in early spring and the subsequent drought in the northern counties. The condition is 98. The fears excited by the excessive heat early in July in northern Dakota now certain a shortage exists, which will keep prices well sustained.

The wheat market is advancing and stocks are large. The quality of the new crop is fair. The general prospects of last month's dispatch are confirmed. Counting the decreased acreage the total output of European wheat will be onefifth less than last year and one-tenth Russian advices are worse.

Oats-The condition of oats is repre sented by 100, a figure surpassed only by last August since 1870. North of parallel 40 degrees the high condition is almost universal. In some western districts there has been injury from lodging, the result of storms.

Barley-The condition of barley averages 95, the same as in August, 1882, since 1874. The average for New York is 102, Pennsylvania 97, Ohio 80, Michigan 96, Wisconsin 96, Minnesota 96, Iowa 99, Nebraska and California 88. These states produce more than twothirds of the crop.

Potatoes-The returns indicate the full development of the potatoe crop condiborder, where the soil has been saturated with moisture.

Buckwheat-The breadth of buckwheat equal to that of last year has been sown and its condition is high, represented by 99.
