The St. Joe house, on Main street, is being greatly improved, repainted and refitted. The aldermen do not seem in so great a rush to draw their back pay as they were to vote it. Yesterday was Assumption Day, and it was quite generally observed by the Catholics here. The Daughters of Rebekah held an enjoyable soiree last evening at William Keelmer's residence. The man Sullivan, with whom Officer Mullen had such a struggle, was yesterday fined \$7.00 for being drunk. Lower's hotel, on Main street, is being wholly rejuvenated, and put in good shape. Mr. Lower is to conduct it himself. The brick work on the large new building to be used by the Sanitorial manufacturing company is being pushed along rapidly. It is about time to revive the talk about getting the C. B. & Q. to build a new depot to take place of the present passage shed. Mr. Charles Carroll has had the shadow fall on his home by the death of his infant child. The funeral was held yesterday. Officer Morse yesterday picked up four suspicious characters, young men, but as there was nothing to hold them on they were turned loose with a warning to skip. The shade trees are being trimmed up to make way for telephone and telegraph wires, and the lopping off of limbs is making several protests on the part of owners. The opera house is daily getting nearer completion, and one can now get a pretty fair idea of what it is to be. It is expected to be finished ready to open by November. License to wed was yesterday given to Richard James and Harriet C. Thompson, both of Rockford township; also to Elmer Pratt, of this city, and Clara Winsley, of Avoca. H. W. Barr, of Cromwell, has decided to become a permanent resident of Council Bluffs and has taken an interest in the mill and broom factory of P. T. Mayne, the new firm being Barr & Mayne. Casady & Orcutt's show windows attract the attention of all passers-by. They are very tasteful. The firm not only have goods to display, but have a happy faculty of knowing how to display them. Everything indicates that the excursion to Spirit Lake, over the Sioux City route, starting to-morrow, is to be more successful than was anticipated even. It affords an opportunity for an abundance of rest and recreation for very little money. There were special services at the Catholic church yesterday, it being a holy day. Excellent music was rendered and the congregations were large at each service. Those of the Catholic citizens who could do so, closed their business places and dropped work also. The job department of the Council Bluffs BEE office, is turning out some very fine and unique work, fully up to the latest fashions of the art. The coming fair will draw big crowds to Council Bluffs, September 10th and 11th, that is, if the public appreciates enterprise and a lavish expenditure of money on the part of the managers. Not only are the purses for the races heavy one and the premiums in all departments numerous and liberal, but there are to be many novel features, including the chariot and hurdle races, the baby and doll shows, the sewing machine

to be given to the boss girl of western Iowa, and plenty of fun as well as sights for all who come.

There is a strange quiet about the new governmental building which Council Bluffs is to have. There has not yet been a blow struck and there seems little likelihood of anything being done this season. No one seems to know exactly why there is this delay, but it is surmised to be on account of the Hill investigation, which causes a general suspension of other activities in the architect's department.

After he was gone it was discovered that he had stolen \$200 in the values of Misses Rundlett and Maloney, two ladies who were attending the institute. He went to the livery stable and hired a pony to ride out to Mr. Johnson's, who lives north of town a few miles, and started out that way. But it appears he changed his course and went south, as the pony was found the following day hitched to a post near Avoca. He was not doing anything while here, and claimed to be waiting for goods. Before leaving he took two trunks to the depot and ordered one to be shipped east and the other west. Word was forwarded to arrest whoever called for the trunks, and the culprit may yet be taken in. Rev. Mr. Lemen Once More Firmly Seated in the Pulpit.

The troubles which have of late been attending the pastorate of the Baptist church were settled at a business meeting held Thursday evening. Rev. Mr. Lemen a time back resigned the pastorate and was then recalled as a supply, which called forth some opposition and caused a number to withdraw from the society. Last Tuesday evening, at the regular business meeting of the church, he was settled as a permanent pastor, there being no further opposition, the disaffected ones who had not already withdrawn asking for and being granted their letters, there being fifteen of these, which added to the eleven who withdrew before makes twenty-six. The remainder of the church is united and now that they have settled Mr. Lemen as a regular pastor, and all opposition to him is removed from the church, they will have no occasion now for any further divisions or contentions.

The Blackett Case.

About the only sensation in the court yesterday was monopolized by Justice Abbott. It was the Blackett case. A motion was made by Attorney Lindt for another continuance, and over this he and Attorney Sears held a lively wrangle until noon. Lindt, who appeared for the defence, wanted another wait of thirty days, as it was expected that Mrs. Blackett, who is now in the insane asylum, would be well enough to be out by that time and was a material witness. The prosecution finally agreed to admit that she would testify to all that was claimed, she would swear to, and the court decided in that view of the matter not to grant the continuance, a very happy relief for the justice, as the case has already had thirteen continuances, besides numerous changes of venue. The alleged assault took place early in June, and the matter has dragged along ever since. It is claimed by the defense that Reimer, the mate, who is the prosecuting witness, is the one who should be punished. The disturbance arose about some drift wood, and while Reimer claims that Blackett assaulted him, Blackett, on the other hand, claims that Reimer assaulted his wife with an ax, and what he did was in defense of her. He claims Mrs. Blackett was so badly injured as to throw her into a fever, and to last land her in an insane asylum. The taking of testimony has at last commenced, and it is expected to continue through to-day at least.
