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

winte I was sailing. At another time, when crossing the Himalayas, overlooking the valley of the Sutledge, I remarked a tremulous appearance in the atmos phere, as of a mirage. On further inves-tigation, I ascertained that this strange quivering was produced by the glancing angut on the myriad wings of a great warm of locusts which were passing over

the valley like a cloud.

But those glimpses of the locust hosts were as nothing compared with the vast flights described by brother Roualeyn, a the interior of South Africa.
