MOCKING BIRDS.

Where They Come From and The 600. Prices They Bring.

"I have been buying and selling birds for the last ten years," said a dealer to a Louisville Courier Journal reporter. buy 'em in New Orleans from the dealers there, and bring them up here and to northern cities. I only buy mocking birds, as good canaries are worth more there than they are here. These which you see I have swapped my birds for, and am taking them back to sell on my next trip. I will get \$3 or \$4 for them there, while up here they are worth only about half as much.

"How much do the others cost you?" "The 'mockers' cost me 50 cents apiece in New Orleans when I buy from the bird merchants. They are creoles who buy them from the boys who make a business of catching the young ones before they leave the nest. When I buy from these boys I only have to pay 10 or 15 cents apiece, but it is not often I have the chance as I don't stay long and must get
