THE AUTUMN AWAKENING.
Season at the Seaside Closing, and Humanity Returning to work.
First Two Failures in the Theatrical Line--Kiralpy's Spectacular Success.
Betting on the Dwyer Horses, and Why it Don't Pay.

New York, August 26.—With the middle of August past, New York is turning its eyes toward the fall season. The tide of European travel has already turned westward, and it will not be long before the summer resorts also send their contingent of New Yorker home.
"Most people," said the stage driver, as we rolled down Broadway yesterday, "go away to spend just so much time, others go to spend just so much money, and a few go away regardless of money."
Most of us, who belong to the first or second of these classes, have had our fling, and are getting back to work. The last is such a diminutive portion of the whole that their going or coming makes but little difference in the general crowd. New York's adjacent resorts will be popular for a month yet, but places as near as Long Branch are reducing their prices, in hopes of filling up their empty rooms. While most of the hotel keepers at Long Branch decline that the season now drawing to a close has been satisfactory, they qualify the declaration by saying that last year was better, and even other years excelled the present one. There is hardly a doubt, however, that Long Branch did as well as if, not better than many other watering places; and the hotels least paid their expenses. There is no reason why Long Branch should fail to do well. It has a ten mile drive that has few equals anywhere else. It is at an elevation above the beach, and commands a sweeping view of the ocean from end to end. It is kept in fine order and carriages roll over it as smoothly as if it were covered with a Brussels carpet. It has the most perfect race course near at hand. The bathing can be improved upon, the air is pure and exhilarating, and there are no mosquitos. These qualifications recommend Long Branch and the popular patronage it has received year after year shows that they are appreciated. Like Newport in one respect, Long Branch goes largely into cottages. Cottages link the hotels together along almost five miles of the beach. Between the West End Hotel and Elberon, a distance of two miles, it is all cottages, and such an endless variety of cottages would be hard to find anywhere else. Out of over a hundred built by Mr. L. B. Brown, of New York, not two are alike. Some of them present an extremely bizarre appearance, with gables, walls, roofs and chimneys twisted into the most fantastic shapes, and painted gaudily. But though odd, and in many instances out of taste, and defying all the canons of architectural propriety, they have a very picturesque effect, standing within lawns closely shaven, and green like a carpet of emerald velvet. The finest part of Long Branch is undoubtedly the section extending from the West End Hotel to Elberon. The drive way, too, is wide, and the views are more varied and extensive.

AN ORANG-OUTANG GROUP.
The Latest Addition to the National Museum at Washington.

Standing in the southwest corner of the National museum building is the frame of a large case, a little over eleven feet long, nearly six feet wide and ten and a half feet high. This is destined to be within the next two or three weeks the recipient of a group of five orang-outangs, mounted in the highest style of the taxidermist's art, and forming an interesting and valuable addition to the museum collection. The group will be styled "A fight in the tree-top." Two of the orang-outangs are already in position, and the others are being mounted. The other two which are completed give the group the title. They are two old males, savagely fighting after their fashion. One, an angry monster, is hanging by his long, hairy arm to a high branch of a tree, while his handlike feet grasp a lower branch. In his teeth he has the finger of another male, and is biting through it, while the blood flows from the wound. The other orang-outang, which is also grasping the tree, shows in his countenance every expression of human rage. His cavernous mouth is thrown open as if in the act of howling with anger and pain, and his enormous canine teeth are fully exposed. The rest of the group will consist of a female with an infant clinging to her breast in the act of fleeing from the conflict, and a young orang-outang about 2 years old observing the fight from a rest in a tree. It has the Monkey's face, and is only to be mounted in order to be ready for exhibition. The case will be placed in the southern hall of the museum, and its contents are certain to be the greatest attraction in the whole museum collection.

Mocking Birds.
Where They Come From and the Prices They Bring.
"I have been buying and selling birds for the last ten years," said a dealer to a Louisville Courier Journal reporter. "I buy 'em in New Orleans from the dealers there, and bring them up here and to northern cities. I only buy mocking birds, as good canaries are worth more than they are here. These which you see I have swapped my birds for, and am taking them back to sell on my next trip. I will get \$3 or \$4 for them there, while up here they are worth only about half as much."
"How much do the others cost you?"
"The mockers cost me 50 cents apiece in New Orleans when I buy from the bird merchants. They are creoles who buy them from the boys who make a business of catching the young ones before they leave the nest. When I buy from these boys I only have to pay 10 or 15 cents apiece, but it is not often I have the chance to do so. I don't stay long and must get up a lot as soon as possible."
"Who catches the birds and where do they find them?"
"The boys, black and white, who live out on the plantations and the coast. They make a regular business of this, and when they catch enough they bring them to the city and sell them to the street bird merchants. It is against the law now to take them from the plantations, and most of them come from the seacoast."
"Where do the old ones build their nests?"
"Everywhere, almost, but generally in wild rose bushes, old fences, and low trees. They are not very particular about their nests, and make 'em out of a few sticks, which they lay up together and fix them so they will just hold the eggs. They lay four or five, and every one hatches. When left to themselves they raise only two broods, but when they are taken out by the catchers they lay and hatch three or four. The business is a much larger one than you might think, as thousands of young birds are bought and sold every day."
"Where do you get your parrots?"
"I bought them of the New Orleans dealers, too. They get 'em off boats which are sent to catch 'em on the islands and on the coast. They are not very smart, and can't talk, but they sell as well as lots of people want them. They cost \$2 or \$3 down there, and here we get \$7 or \$8, dependin' mostly on the customer."
"Where do you sell your stocks?"
"Oh, most everywhere. I bring 'em here, and take 'em to lots of northern cities. People in northern towns pay the best prices, but they like canaries better than mockers."
"What sort of people buy the most?"
"Working people. Since I have been here I have sold only two or three to rich customers. It seems like they had rather have dogs than birds." Here a contemptuous expression passed over the dealer's face.

IMPROVED TELEPHONE.
An Inventor Who Claims That Conversation Across the Atlantic Will be Possible.

New York, August 26.—There is an inventor in the village of Flushing, L. I., who believes he has an apparatus that will revolutionize the telephone business, and materially increase the usefulness of the Atlantic cable. He has rooms in a large boarding house about a block from the railroad station. Here he has passed the last four months at work upon his invention. His name is Webster Gillett, and is from Michigan. A reporter found him seated in a little room, in which were tables loaded with electrical apparatus, and a network of wires stretched between the walls.
The inventor appeared to be about forty years old. He has lively, dark blue eyes, a high forehead that bulges in the region of constructiveness, brown mustache and side whiskers, and a ruddy and healthful countenance. On the largest table in the room stood a disk about thirteen inches in diameter. Projecting from one edge of the disk was a funnel-shaped object. Running into the table from the lower edge of the disk were a number of wires. On the table arranged in a row a short distance from the wires were ten black cylindrical induction coils. That is what the reporter noticed. This the inventor said: "That funnel-shaped object in the center of the disk is the resonator. You see that it is not like the speaking tube of an ordinary telephone. The larger part of the funnel is held to the mouth. The volume of the voice, instead of being concentrated in a small space, as in other telephones, is spread over, and causes the whole metallic diaphragm to vibrate. You get the same on the opposite side of the disk there are ten diaphragms, which are held in position by ten rubber arms, that may remind you somewhat of a cuttlefish. When you talk through the speaking tube or resonator, the metallic diaphragm, or popularly speaking, the tin plate, vibrates. The vibrations are communicated to the ten deviating points or resonators. These resonators penetrate through rubber cushions into ten brass cylinders containing granulated carbon. The cylinders are secured in their places by ten brass arms attached to the rim of the disk that holds the metallic plate. Ten wires run through the arms from the primaries of the induction coils and return to their respective poles. The ten secondary wires from the induction coils are carried to a plug switch, so arranged as to place one or as many wires as may be desired in circuit. The power of ten batteries, ten induction coils, and a corresponding number of deviating points, acted upon simultaneously by a single vibrating tin plate, may thus be concentrated upon a single wire. This is

Speaking of Kiralpy's "Excelsior," he said: "It is a spectacular extravaganza, full of show and stage effects. It is a queer piece, and unlike anything ever seen in many respects. It is an attempt to introduce Parisian ballet with all its accessories. It has sixteen scenes. One scene in the second act shows a temple high up in the clouds. In a terraced scene, which has a deal of ornamental architecture, there is some fine marching, dancing and grouping. The telegraph scene shows a telegraph office in St. Petersburg; this is realistic. In this scene a number of messenger boys come in and do some good dancing. Then there is the Suez canal scene, with flags and banners showing a great tunnel interior. The last scene is a gorgeous effect of light and color and stagecraft, representing the Temple of Peace, in which the dance of all nations is performed, illuminated by the electric light."
