The trustees of the new Masonic temple met last night and awarded the contract for masonry to Chas. Schraub. W. J. Wagner, of Denison, while waiting for the Union Pacific train, lost his grip, some sneak-thief walking off with it. The Union Pacific train was again late yesterday morning, and all the outgoing Chicago trains had to wait nearly one hour. Mr. Hodles, the scenic artist of the new opera house, is preparing plans for the frescoing and other decorations of the interior. Three runaways in one day, and no special damage done by any one of them is rather discouraging to reporters who chased them out. George R. Beard has taken the contractor for doing the painting and graining of the large and new Cheney house at Missouri valley. John Weaver has been awarded the contract for mason work on a large residence to be erected by Mr. Weis near that of Judge James. Miss Pussie Keating gave a farewell party Thursday evening at her home, to her young friends, preparatory to her departure for Notre Dame college. Those promised drinking fountains ought not to be overlooked, and should be put in place at once, so as to start up simultaneously with the rest of the water works. The confidence men and crooks shall not be allowed to gather in and work the fair. If arrested for vagrancy as fast as they arrive, it might have a healthy influence. Clayton & Scofield's elevator at Walnut had a close call. Fire got started in their coal house, but the bucket brigade managed to put it out before any serious damage was done. Prostitutes begins to act again as if they owned the streets and sidewalks, and are as brazen as before the time when they were driven off the streets. Another war of reformation is needed. Justice Schurz yesterday tied a double hard knot, the matrimonial aspirants all being from Florence, Neb. One of the happy couples was David E. Bird and Clara B. Elbert, the other Thos. Langerway and Miss Emma Myer. It is claimed that in the artesian well sunk by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul company, as well as in Mr. Geise's artesian well, Council Bluffs has as health giving mineral water as can be found in the whole country. Martin Lawler had some little difficulty with John Gegan while hauling dirt near the opera house, and the latter complained of him for hitting his Gegan's horses with a whip. Justice Schurz discharged him. The colored population seems stirred up a good deal about its representative to the Louisville convention. Willis and Curtis both insist that they will go, when only one is needed, and the friends of each are biting and backbiting to an alarming degree. A young man from Big Grove was brought in yesterday and examined by the insane commissioners with a view of sending him to the asylum. It was concluded that his mind was not affected seriously enough to warrant sending him there, and he was taken home again. The aldermen, with the city engineer and mayor, were riding about in carriages yesterday inspecting the levee, the grounds on which the C. B. & O. wants to build its new depot, and other matters in which the city is specially interested just now. The following pupils will represent Council Bluffs at the Benedictines college in Atchison, Kansas, during the coming term: Thos. Hughes, L. Kirsch, Jr., Oscar Linder, John Dohoney, Jr., and Frank Wickham. The boys will start Monday. A team belonging to G. W. Crossby, a farmer living southeast of town, started for home yesterday without a driver. They came down Broadway on the jump, but struck a lamp-post on the corner of Fourth street and Broadway, when they concluded to stop. No damage, except

that one of the horses received a slight bruise.

Marshal Smith, of Des Moines, was here Wednesday night, having in charge Harry Martin, who had deserted from Fort Omaha. He took yesterday morning's train back home, and was just in the nick of time to help catch the darkey who stole Jake Roger's roll.

There was a pleasant surprise party last evening, of which Miss Lizzie Racer was the honored victim. Her friends met at Miss Emma Daugherty's, and then proceeded in a body to Miss Racer's house, capturing her fairly. There was much merriment and a jolly time for all.

A. F. Clatterback is aspiring to the securing of the nomination for sheriff at the hands of the republicans. He has served as deputy and as constable, and his friends have had a chance to get an idea as to what sort of a sheriff he will make. One thing is certain there are many worse men than Clatterback for sheriff.

John Hight has filed papers showing that he is not in the height of enjoyment. He avows that his wife, Emeline, to whom he was married last March, began as soon as July to be altogether too intimate with other men, and that she confessed her wanderings to him. He wants now to cut loose and let her wander.

In the circuit court yesterday the case of Watson vs. The K. C. & St. Joe Railway company was on trial, it being a claim for damages on account of a horse killed by the cars. Mr. Watson don't seem to get along very well with the railroads. He had a foot taken off while unloading some lumber from a car, and has had two or more trials about that, and now he has had a horse killed.

There was a jolly gathering of the noble order of bachelors at Miss Baldwin's last evening as a sort of farewell to one of their number, Mr. Dunn, who is soon to leave the city. Other friends, and firm ones too, and joined in the gathering, and a very happy social occasion it proved for all concerned, save for the feeling of regret that Mr. Dunn was so soon to take his departure.

The Knight Templars are returning homeward, and each day companies pass through to the eastward. The Philadelphia knights, who arrived here Wednesday, were taken east over the Chicago & Northwestern road in a hurry. The train was a special, and consisted of engine, two baggage cars, six Pullmans and a diner, and it reached Chicago in sixteen hours. No ex-team business about that sort of running, sure.

The new postal notes have been received at the postoffice here, and the sale will commence Monday morning. They are about the size of a bank note, and can be made out for any sum from one cent to five dollars. The fee is only three cents, and they are made payable to bearer, being drawn upon any office and payable either there or at the office issuing them. They must be presented within three months after issuing, or else an additional fee will be charged.

The prohibitionists held a very enthusiastic but not very largely attended meeting last evening. About fifty were present. W. D. Mayes acted as chairman, and committees were appointed on music and soliciting. An executive committee was also appointed. Addresses were made by Dr. Chase, of Cherokee, Iowa, and Mr. Mayes. On motion of Mr. L. W. Tulleys, seconded by Rev. Mr. Armstrong, it was unanimously decided to hold a county convention at such date as the executive committee should decide.

There is being put in place by the waterworks company a patent arrangement, of which Birkinbine is the inventor, by which extra air pressure can be applied in time of fire, giving four good streams at one time in any part of the city. The part of the arrangement located in the city building is an upright iron cylinder, which looms up in the chief's office like a big heater. The pressure from the mains fills it partly with water, the rest being compressed air. When an alarm is sent in a small wheel can be turned and the compressed air rushing through a pipe leading to the gate house at the reservoir, closes the valve there, stopping the flow of water from the mains into the mains. It is expected that the fire protection features of the waterworks will prove most ample and complete in all respects.

Another Horse Thief Collared. Sheriff Jacob, of Keokuk county, was in the city yesterday on the hunt for a man named J. W. He telegraphed officers there to arrest the man and they soon had him, and were holding him for Sheriff Jacob to come on last night, the sheriff to meet the prisoner at Avaca, and take him back to Keokuk county.

ROGERS' ROLL.

It was a Fat One, and a Coon Walked Or With It.

The Capture of the Dusky Youth at Atlantic, Iowa.

Jake Rogers, the well known bus man, was the victim Wednesday night of a heavy theft. He has a desk in the reading room of the Pacific house, and in the drawer of the desk he placed about \$150. Before he had turned the lock and taken out his keys his attention was called elsewhere and he stepped away, leaving the drawer a big temptation to any one in need of funds. Yesterday morning on opening the drawer he was naturally surprised to find the roll gone. It also appeared that a colored fellow, a porter about the house, named Farnsworth, was nowhere to be found. Suspicion connecting him with the taking of the money investigation commenced, and it was soon traced out that Farnsworth had gone away in the night, taking a freight. The wires were set at work and a telegram was received by Mr. Rogers for the yardmaster at Atlantic, saying: 'Conductor of No. 4 told me you lost some money this morning. Think I can find your man here. There was a colored man came from Weston to Atlantic on No. 6 this a. m. He is a short man in size and had a roll with him.'

This answering the description, word was sent back to arrest him, and soon another telegram was received, saying: 'Marshal Smith, of Des Moines, will arrive in Council Bluffs on No. 3. Has your man.'

It appears that the colored man had at Atlantic bought a ticket for Des Moines. He had also, somewhere, bought a new watch, and when caught he had \$108. Marshal Smith was on his way back to Des Moines, having just taken a deserter back to Omaha, and he took the fellow in charge to bring back to this city. He arrived here with him last night. Farnsworth has worked in the house for several years and was implicitly trusted, never having shown any special propensities. The temptation presented by so careless a leaving of the money proved too much for him. The keys to the drawer were found in his pocket, as well as the balance of the roll, and the watch he bought.
