Now that the President has returned to Washington, the seat of government is no longer vacant.

The Herald is clamoring for information from the Stinking Water region. We hope it will be commensurate with what shall be every way satisfactory, soon.

The Italian colony in New York is said to number about 25,000 adult males, seven-tenths of whom, it is claimed, possess the rights of suffrage.

A movement is now in progress, headed by some of the more influential of the colonists, designed to bring the colonists under the influence of a representative organization for political purposes.

Mr. Morosi, the president, says that they will be neither strictly democratic nor strictly republican, but independent, with the best interests of the community in view; that the best platform and best candidates will receive their support, and that they will have nothing to do with politicians of the pavement.

The organization is certainly a commendable one. Natives of a foreign country, but American citizens now, they propose to act politically, not as partisans, but as citizens having in view the best interests of the country.

The Greenbackers in the State of New York have held their convention, made their nominations and adopted their platform. Resolutions were adopted which embodied the well known views of that party that the government bonds should be paid as rapidly as possible, that the national banks should be abolished, and that the currency of the country should be supplied by the issue of legal tender notes.

The platform which was adopted is strong against all kinds of monopoly, and arraigns the New York Central Railroad as having "watered debts" to the amount of \$10,000,000, and the Erie Railway as having \$60,000,000 of stock the proceeds of which were appropriated to the personal use and benefit of the officers, "as testified to by a director."

The platform denounces the contract prison labor system, and holds that prisons should be located on the mineral lands owned by the state in northern sections; that the prisoners should be employed in developing the mineral resources of the state so that their labor will not come in competition with the products of honest mechanics' toil, and that the prisoners should be paid for all they earn in excess of the actual cost of their keeping; that the ballot box is the only place through which American working men can strike and obtain permanent relief from their present wrongs.

The suggestion in regard to the dispensing of prison labor has in it a good deal that is worthy of consideration. The fifth resolution of their platform is remarkable. If it can be taken as containing much truth, it is a severe commentary on the intelligence of the people of the state.

Fifth. That most of the laws contained in the penal code of the state are against the whole theory of free government and a standing insult to the citizens and should be repealed.

WEST OF THE MISSOURI. The recent invasion of Wyoming by Bothwell surveying party, has stirred up a great deal of speculation as to the intentions of the party and their backers.

The route mapped is that over which the presidential party recently traveled from Fort Washakie to the Yellowstone park. Some enthusiasts affect to believe it means a north and south road from the park to Denver, there to connect with the Denver & New Orleans line and thence to the Gulf.

Others map out a new east and west line from Chicago to the park, over which the products of a great wheat and stock raising region would pass. Neither of these schemes have much foundation to rest upon.

To begin with the Sioux City & Pacific, Chicago & Northwestern and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul are moving in that direction with reasonable rapidity, which will preclude, possibly for all time, the construction of a fourth line to Chicago.

The Sioux city road will probably reach the Black Hills in the course of another year. The manager and chief engineer of that company have recently returned from a trip over the intervening region and report themselves well satisfied with the route and the prospects of the country which would be tributary to it.

The Northwestern and Milwaukee are pushing through the part of Southern Dakota as fast as the development of the country will admit and business secured.

Perhaps the safest explanation of the present move is to ascribe it to the Union Pacific, to protect itself from the diversion of traffic caused by the opening of the Northern Pacific.

The number of tourists to the park will increase rapidly now that the discomforts of staging are done away with. The Northern Pacific with its branch to the park makes it the most desirable route, with which the Union Pacific and Utah & Northern cannot compete.

There can be little doubt that the Union Pacific will build north through Wyoming at an early day. It has already agreed with Cheyenne and Laramie county, in consideration of bonds voted, to build 100 miles of road within a certain time, and with the completion of the Oregon Short Line the construction force of the company will doubtless begin operations in Wyoming.

And for all purposes here now so shown) to be unlawfully intruded and encroached upon by these defendants by the erection of an unlawful enclosure or fence on the following described part of the said public domain of the United States; and "That they discontinue the use of the lands so unlawfully intruded and encroached upon, and restore the lands to their former and usual condition. And it is further adjudged, ordered and decreed that said defendants be further restrained from continuing on said public domain the said fence or enclosure by them built," or, in other words, the fences must go.

Secretary Teller, of the Interior Department, who has recently traveled through the cattle regions of Colorado and Kansas, proposes to supplement the decision of Judge Sener with vigorous action against the fencing of public land along the borders of Indian Territory.

In a late interview the secretary said the interior department had received numerous complaints during the summer, mostly from small herders who were being crowded to the wall by the fast growing cattle monopolists of the west.

The editor of the McCook Tribune has struggled in vain to publish a \$2.00 paper in a twenty five cent town. His valiantly is intensely brief and pathetic: "Readers of the Tribune, for more than one year we have been your servants. We are out of office and out of money."

Dr. Graf, of Omaha, who is engineering the development of the oil field of Wyoming, has returned from a visit to England, where he is supposed to have secured the necessary capital for active work. The company, of which he is the working head, proposes to erect a large refinery at Point of Rocks station, which is situated sixty-nine miles south of the oil fields. This will have a capacity of 3,000 barrels of refined kerosene per day.

A pipeline will be built to the wells at a cost of about \$225,000, to convey the crude oil, and bull trains will also run between the wells and Point Rocks, transporting lubricating oil. The oil, in transit through the pipe line, will have to be carried over an elevation of 2,000 feet, but heavy pumps will do the work.

Dr. Graf expects to have the pipe line operation this fall and the refinery under way. A Pennsylvania expert, who recently examined these oil fields, thinks that the oil, if found in the paying quantities he anticipates, will be used "principally as fuel and for smelting the ores found in such abundance in the mountains of the territory. Smelting is now a very expensive process, as coke ranges in price from \$25 to \$30 per ton. The coke lump produced at the price now ruling in this region, would cost but \$7 per ton, and a ton of petroleum would do about three times the work of a ton of coke. It would undoubtedly, in time, prove a vigorous competitor of Pennsylvania oil for lighting purposes, as refined petroleum now sells in the territory at twenty cents per gallon. With continued growth of the west there will be no lack of a home market for all that can be produced.

An important coal strike has been made in the Bull Mountains, Montana, which promises immense returns in the near future. The locality called Bull Mountains are a line of bare but very high hills about fifty miles from Billings, on the line of the proposed Northern Pacific branch from Billings to Benton. It is the heart of a section that stands much in need of a supply of fuel before it can be generally settled. To supply the demands of the railroad all will take the capacity of pretty extensive mines. All the coal in this section is very encouraging, the latest examination reporting a vein seventeen feet in thickness.

The Oregon Short Line of the Union Pacific is rapidly approaching completion. It is confidently expected that the road will be finished to Burnt river, where it connects with the Oregon railway, before snow flies. The grading is finished to that point east about 80 miles to iron, which is being put down at the rate of two and a half miles a day. About 448 miles of track are in operation, and extending from Granger, Wyo., to Kuna, Idaho. Besides this the Wood River branch, 57 miles, will be put in operation this season.

PLATE COUNTY. Special Dispatch to THE BEE. COLUMBUS, Neb., September 8.—At the Republican county convention to-day delegations to the State and judicial conventions were selected. Nominations for county officers were postponed until October. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted as reflecting the sentiment of the Republicans of Plate county: Resolved, That the Republicans of Plate county endorse the action of Gov. Dawes in appointing Hon. A. M. Post Judge of the Fourth Judicial district, and that they look with pride at the high position the appointee has achieved in the estimation of the law and people of the State and State as an able and impartial jurist, and that we hereby, in convention assembled, instruct the delegates from Plate county to the Republican judicial convention to cast the solid vote of said county in favor of his nomination to the judgeship.
